Doctor of Humane Letters

Martha Craven Nussbaum Ernst Freund Distinguished Service Professor of Law and Ethics, University of Chicago

Presented by Jeffrey A. Bowman Professor of History

Martha Nussbaum: Drawing inspiration from classical philosophy, you have become a leading advocate of the transformative promise of liberal education and an inspiring proponent of innovative approaches to global development. In essays and books, you have matched erudition with bracing clarity of purpose. You have reinvented traditional disciplines by showing us how to bridge the study of ethics and literature, philosophy and politics, classics and law. You have felt the moral seriousness of fiction, describing the manifold ways in which novels cultivate our sympathies and move us beyond the limits of our own experience. You have argued that humanities must inform the ideals and practices of citizenship as the forum where meditation on our interior lives enriches reflection on our collective responsibilities. Fully to assess the "quality of life" at stake in our projects for development and social justice, you have joined with Amartya Sen and others to pioneer the "capability approach," which recognizes the diverse ways we thrive as human beings. As you have taught us, liberal education demands that we ask ourselves the enduring Socratic question: What does it mean to lead a good life? Your wide-ranging answers to this question gently master ancient thought and urge us to see the distinctive challenges and opportunities of the current moment. The demands of Socratic self-reflection, compelling in ancient Athens, are perhaps even more urgent in a world where the contours of citizenship are increasingly transposed to a global scale. Imbued with a moral urgency, your writings reflect an imagination that is, in Henry James's words, "finely aware and richly responsible." For your contributions as a classicist, philosopher, public intellectual, and, not least, Socratic gadfly, we honor you today.

Doctor of Letters

Jonathan Franzen Writer

Presented by Sergei Lobanov-Rostovsky Professor of English

Jonathan Franzen, we honor you today not for who you are: bestselling novelist, essavist, journalist, and critic, National Book Award winner, literary celebrity whose cultural importance has been sanctified by the cover of Time and, not once but twice, by Oprah's Book Club, object of a whole new form of literary envy—Franzenfreude. Instead, we honor you for what you do each day: create fictions that capture us with their wit and then enlarge us with their compassion and humanity. As a reader, I'd honor you just for the beauty of a few perfect sentences. But what is most striking about your novels is the way that they reveal to us small characters on a broad canvas. You don't hesitate to take on the grand themes—a culture in a crisis of anxious prosperity, the mysterious ways in which happiness eludes us, the reduction of human emotions to diagnosable, treatable, and highly profitable forms of chemical imbalance, in short, the way we live now—but each of these themes emerges in your novels through the fine details of closely examined lives. A brilliant social satirist, you are merciless to your characters ("Julia wore the heads-up look of a squirrel convinced that somebody has stale bread in his pocket"), revealing their self-deceptions and their consuming despair, but only to solicit our recognition and our sympathy. We see them as we see ourselves in our moments of greatest honesty. Jonathan Franzen, you've shown us the beauty of complexity in characters and culture, syntax and human sympathy. We honor you today for that challenge to our understanding, that ambition and stunning accomplishment, that carefully wrought and hard-won grace.

Honors at Graduation

The degree with collegiate honors is achieved by attaining a cumulative grade-point average within the following ranges:

3.50-3.69, cum laude; 3.70-3.89, magna cum laude; 3.90 and above, summa cum laude.

Students showing exceptional scholarship may be accepted by their major department to read for the degree with departmental honors. The three major classes of departmental honors, based on work in the major, are Honors, High Honors, and Highest Honors, as determined jointly by an outside examiner and the members of the student's department.

A Senior Exercise must be satisfactorily completed by each graduating senior. While each department determines the nature of its exercise, the purpose in general is to promote coherence of the student's major program. Each department reports a grade of Pass, or Pass with Distinction, for this exercise.

Phi Beta Kappa, Beta Chapter of Ohio. Phi Beta Kappa, the oldest Greek-letter fraternity in the country, was founded in 1776. The Kenyon chapter was organized in 1858 as an honorary society dedicated to the recognition of scholarly achievement. It is the fourteenth in age of 276 chapters. Elections to membership are made from the best scholars in the junior and senior classes who have shown achievement through grades and an intellectual disposition.

Notes

A student completing a double major has met all the requirements for the major in two departments and passed a Senior Exercise in each. A synoptic major, individually designed by the student to meet his or her special interests, includes work in two or more departments and requires satisfactory completion of one Senior Exercise. An asterisk (*) denotes that the student passed the Senior Exercise with distinction.

Commencement 2011

Kenyon's one hundred eighty-third Commencement ceremony features a renowned novelist, an esteemed philosopher, and the more than four hundred young men and women of the Class of 2011 who will parade down Middle Path one last time before taking themselves and their diplomas out into the world.

The graduation ceremony is being held today, Saturday, May 21, starting at 10:30 a.m., on the lawn between two of the College's oldest academic buildings, Ascension Hall and Samuel Mather Science Hall, with the audience facing Samuel Mather. The rainsite is the Kenyon Athletic Center, one of the most recent additions to the campus.

The Baccalaureate service took place yesterday, on Friday, May 20, at 1:30 p.m. This year's speaker, chosen by the seniors, was Head Men's Swimming Coach James A. Steen. A member of the College's coaching staff since 1975, he guided the men's team to twenty-nine of its record thirty-one consecutive National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) national championships. Although he has now stepped down from his leadership of the women's team, twenty-one of its twenty-three national titles were earned under his tutelage. Steen has won more NCAA national championships than any other coach in any NCAA sport.

Following the Baccalaureate service, the graduating class gathered to partake in a cherished Kenyon tradition, the Senior Sing, which—if the weather cooperated—took place on the steps of Rosse Hall. Commencement Weekend also featured all-campus seminars by Associate Professor of Art History Sarah Blick and Associate Professor of Anthropology Bruce Hardy.

Remarks to the graduating class will be offered by both of today's honorary-degree recipients, Martha Craven Nussbaum and Jonathan Franzen.

Martha Nussbaum, who will be awarded an honorary doctor of humane letters degree, is a noted philosopher and the Ernst Freund Distinguished Service Professor of Law and Ethics at the University of Chicago, a joint appointment among the divinity and law schools and the philosophy department. She is also affiliated with the university's classics and political science departments, Committee on Southern Asia Studies, and Human Rights Program. Nussbaum is the founder and coordinator of the Center for Comparative Constitutionalism at the university.

Nussbaum, who previously taught at Brown, Harvard, and Oxford universities, is a prolific writer. She has written almost two dozen books, many of them prize winners, and edited another fourteen. Among Nussbaum's best known works are The Fragility of Goodness: Luck and Ethics in Greek Tragedy and Philosophy (1986), Cultivating Humanity: A Classical Defense of Reform in Liberal Education (1997), Sex and Social Justice (1998), Hiding from Humanity: Disgust, Shame, and the Law (2004), and From Disgust to Humanity: Sexual Orientation and Constitutional Law (2010). Her most recent book, Creating Capabilities: The Human Development Approach, appeared earlier this year.

The recipient of numerous plaudits for her work, Nussbaum won the Grawemeyer Award in Education in 2002, the Barnard College Medal of Distinction in 2003, the Radcliffe Alumnae Recognition Award in 2007, the American Philosophical Society's Henry M. Phillips Prize in Jurisprudence in 2009, and the Centennial Medal of the Graduate School of Arts and Sciences at Harvard University in 2010. And today's honorary doctorate will be far from her first: Nussbaum has been awarded degrees by thirty-seven other institutions here in the United States and abroad.

A native of New York City, Nussbaum graduated from New York University, where she studied classics and theater. She then moved on to Harvard, where her focus switched to philosophy and she earned her master's degree and doctorate.

Jonathan Franzen, who will receive an honorary doctor of letters degree, is one of the leading writers of the twenty-first century. In fact, no less an arbiter of national and international literary fortune than *Time* magazine featured Franzen on the cover of its August 23, 2010, issue with the headline "Great American Novelist." Another literary kingmaker, Oprah Winfrey, chose both of his most recent novels for her book club.

While his first two novels, *The Twenty-Seventh City* (1988) and *Strong Motion* (1992), were warmly received by critics, Franzen became a literary hero with the publication of his third novel, *The Corrections*. Published in 2001, it went on to win the 2001 National Book Award for Fiction and the 2002 James Tait Black Memorial Prize for Fiction. The book was also a finalist for the 2002 PEN/Faulkner Award and the 2002 Pulitzer Prize for Fiction.

Hailed as a master of story form, Franzen has been praised by critics for his attempts to revive the American social novel. His books are notable not only for their treatment of contemporary ills, among them rampant consumerism and political ennui, but also for the shrewd humor they exhibit.

Franzen is the author, most recently, of *Freedom*, a novel published in 2010. His works also include several nonfiction books, among them the 2002 collection *How to be Alone*, which contains the well-known essay "Perchance to Dream: In an Age of Images, a Reason to Write Novels," and the 2006 memoir *The Discomfort Zone*. Franzen's translation of Frank Wedekind's *Spring Awakening* appeared in 2007, in part to serve as a corrective to what he saw as an "overpraised" 2006 Broadway musical inspired by the controversial 1891 play.

A graduate of Swarthmore College, where he majored in German, Franzen also studied on a Fulbright Fellowship at the Free University in Berlin, Germany. He counts a nephew, Eric Franzen, among the members of today's graduating class at Kenyon.

A History of Kenyon Commencements

Kenyon's founder, Bishop Philander Chase, conducted the first Commencement exercises of the College on September 9, 1829, in a large, bare, basement room in the just-completed center section of Old Kenyon, the first permanent building. There were six graduates: G. Dennison, J.B. Chase, A. Blake, S. Chase, P.C. Freeman, and B.B. Sayre.

As soon as Rosse Chapel (later known as Rosse Hall) was completed (about 1840), the ceremonies were moved there; Rosse was the location for all graduation exercises for more than a century. It was in Rosse Chapel on August 3, 1842, that the class valedictorian, Rutherford B. Hayes, a future president of the United States, delivered a Commencement address entitled "College Life."

Until the 1890s, it was customary for each graduating senior to deliver an oration, sometimes in English but often in Latin, Greek, or Hebrew. Since the number of graduates fluctuated from four in 1879 to eighteen in more prosperous years, the programs could sometimes be completed in an afternoon but often took all day, with an hour-and-a-half break for lunch. By 1894, activities connected with Commencement had assumed such large proportions that events started on Sunday and culminated with the graduation exercises on Thursday.

During World War II, the civilian enrollment at Kenyon shrank to about forty students, but President Gordon Keith Chalmers was determined that every Kenyon graduate should still have his moment of glory. So, in December 1943, formal Commencement ceremonies, with the faculty in full academic regalia, were held for two graduates.

The tremendous influx of students coming to Kenyon after World War II under the provisions of the G.I. Bill made graduating classes so large that Rosse Hall could no longer accommodate Commencement audiences. The first outdoor ceremony was held in 1950, in the same location as today's exercises. The rainsite, at first Wertheimer Fieldhouse, became the Ernst Center in 1982. The fieldhouse was demolished in 2003 to make way for the Kenyon Athletic Center; the Ernst Center was razed in 2009. Since 2006, the Kenyon Athletic Center has served as the rainsite.

Every seventeen years, the move outdoors results in exposure to countless millions of uninvited and unwanted visitors—the cicadas that appear on Gambier Hill in late May and early June. The 1965 Commencement was especially plagued by the harmless insects, which dropped from the trees and piled up in great heaps around the tree trunks. The cicadas last returned in 1999, but the onslaught, with its eerie shrilling, didn't peak until after Commencement. Next invasion: 2016.

Kenyon adheres to its classical tradition of conducting the formal part of the Commencement exercises in Latin and printing diplomas in Latin. But it no longer translates the names of the graduates; up until the late 1960s, William became *Guliemus* and Thomas was transcribed as *Thomam*.

Academic Costume and Procession

Academic gowns represent a tradition handed down from the universities of the Middle Ages. These institutions were founded by the Church; the students, being clerics, were obliged to wear the prescribed gowns at all times. Round caps later became square mortarboards. The hood, originally a cowl attached to the gown, seems to have had three uses: it could be slipped over the head for warmth, worn as a shoulder cape, or, when hanging from the shoulder, used as a bag in which alms could be collected. It is believed that when large wigs were worn the cape part of the hood was cut open in front and a narrow neckband inserted. The entire garment, cape and hood proper, was allowed to fall back, producing approximately the effect we see today.

In America, the hood is the most outstanding feature. Much of the American academic costume is derived from regalia worn at British universities. The usual color for academic gowns in the United States is black. The bachelor's gown is worn closed; the master's and doctor's may be worn open or closed. The shape of the sleeve is the distinguishing mark of the gowns: *bachelor*, long pointed sleeve; *master*, oblong, square cut in back with an arc cut away in front; *doctor*, bell shaped.

Caps are black, as are the tassels for the bachelor of arts (B.A. or A.B.), bachelor of science (B.S. or Sc.B.), and bachelor of engineering (B.E.) degrees. Tassels for the doctor of philosophy (Ph.D.) degree are gold, while those for other graduate and professional degrees may be of the color corresponding to the trimming on the hoods. Special caps—beefeater caps—are worn at Kenyon by the trustees. This type of cap is also used by some European universities.

Many European universities have distinctive caps and gowns that are different from those commonly used in this country. Some of the gowns are of bright colors, some are embellished with fur. A few of these may be noted in the academic procession today.

The shape and size of the hood marks the college degree of the wearer. The hoods are lined with the color of the institution from which the wearer received his or her degree. The trimming of the collar of the hood is the color that designates the degree: liberal arts, white; fine arts and architecture, brown; science, golden yellow; music, pink; divinity, scarlet; law, purple; engineering, orange; philosophy, blue; medicine, green; public health, salmon; forestry, russet; nursing, apricot. With more than fifteen hundred colleges and universities in the United States, various arrangements of the primary colors are used.

Honorary-degree hoods are distinguished as follows: *master* of arts (M.A.), white; doctor of humane letters (L.H.D.) and doctor of letters (Litt.D.), white; doctor of science (Sc.D.), golden yellow; doctor of divinity (D.D.), scarlet; doctor of laws (LL.D.), purple; doctor of fine arts (D.F.A.), brown.
