Doctor of Humane Letters

Jean Blacker Professor of French

Presented by Mortimer M. Guiney *Professor of French*

Jean Blacker, after earning advanced degrees in comparative literature at the University of California at Berkeley and teaching for three years at Ohio State University, you found a home at Kenyon, where you have thrived as a teacher and scholar. Your first book, The Faces of Time, advanced our understanding of what you once termed "the lack of distinction between fact and fiction in the historical narratives of the Middle Ages" and won nomination for the prestigious Aldo and Jeanne Scaglione Prize of the Modern Language Association. Your article "Where Wace Feared to Tread: Latin Commentaries on Merlin's Prophecies in the Reign of Henry II" obtained the first-ever James Randall Leader Award for Outstanding Article in Arthuriana, the flagship journal of the International Arthurian Society. But your many scholarly accomplishments served a greater cause: educating the students to whom you gave the very best of yourself. By combining the highest academic standards with an inexhaustible attention to their intellectual and personal growth, you earned the devotion of the men and women who had the good fortune to be in your classroom. You taught them to read and love the language of Old French, and you developed Kenyon's first courses on Francophone literature of Africa and the Americas. Always a wise mentor to your peers, you recently enhanced their research by serving as the first faculty coordinator of the New Directions Grant of the Great Lakes Colleges Association. And you have worked with the academic-advising office to train colleagues to recognize and respond to diverse styles of learning. As we honor you today and wish you well, we express our pride in your accomplishments and our gratitude for the many gifts you have bestowed upon us.

Aileen Carol Hefferren Chief Executive, Prep for Prep

Aileen Hefferren, we congratulate you today for living a life of distinguished public service. Following your graduation, with a summa cum laude degree in political science and a Phi Beta Kappa key, you took a position as research assistant at the newly formed U.S. Institute of Peace in Washington, D.C., and, later, as assistant managing editor of *The National Interest*, then one of the country's most influential foreign-policy journals. You have since carried your skills and dedication to the world of education, where you now serve as chief executive of Prep for Prep, a nonprofit organization that prepares promising students of color in New York City for placement in private schools, entrance to college, and leadership. You and your staff have a profound impact on the lives of your students, whom you meet as elementary and middle-school students from underserved communities, train for placement in some of the nation's most prominent private schools, counsel closely throughout their school careers, and guide into internships, career workshops, service projects, and highly selective colleges and universities. We have, in fact, welcomed several of these students to Kenyon. As you have said, you aim to "create a force of leaders who reflect our country's diversity and who can transform our society for the better." In addition to your stellar professional work and a busy private life as spouse to Charles, mother of Owen and Perry, and half of a busy home-restoration team, you have remained an active volunteer for the College, serving as a trustee and chairing the board's Diversity Committee and earning the Alumni Council's Distinguished Service Award in 2008. You do us great honor by returning home to Kenyon today.

Doctor of Science

Michael Peter Levine Samuel B. Cummings Jr. Professor of Psychology

Michael Peter Levine: In thirty-three years as a Kenyon faculty member, you have treated the three components of the jobteaching, research, and service—as intertwined rather than categorical. Your professional work on the prevention of eating disorders has shaped your community activism. This was perhaps best evident in your initiation of Eating Disorders Awareness Week in Knox County, an event that is now national. This combination of research and activism has brought you much recognition, including the Research-Practice Partnership Award of the Academy for Eating Disorders earlier this month. This work also reflects your formidable skill at integrating vast amounts of data and theory into a set of succinct and memorable take-home themes, often organized into an acronym. This ability was also evident in your classes. Who among the students in your "Abnormal Psych" classes doesn't remember IMAD—inefficiency, misery, alienation, and disturbance—as the indicators of psychiatric distress? But it wasn't just how you presented information that won you the College's 2003 Trustee Teaching Award or two Senior Cups or two invitations to deliver the Baccalaureate address. Instead, students recognized your devotion to them. They knew the time you took to discuss their projects or problems or achievements was a gift. They understood you were always willing to try to help and encourage them. They, along with your colleagues, loved your legendary wit and remembered the rock lyrics you used as examples. And so, in wishing you and Mary all the best in this new phase of your life in sunny California, I'm going to borrow that technique: "Janey said it was time to go, so we closed our eyes and said goodbye to Gypsy Angel Row. Felt so right."

Graduation Honors

The degree with collegiate honors is achieved by attaining a cumulative grade-point average within the following ranges:

3.50-3.69, cum laude;

3.70-3.89, magna cum laude;

3.90 and above, summa cum laude.

Students showing exceptional scholarship may be accepted by their major department to read for the degree with departmental honors. The three major classes of departmental honors, based on work in the major, are Honors, High Honors, and Highest Honors, as determined jointly by an outside examiner and the members of the student's department.

A Senior Exercise must be satisfactorily completed by each graduating senior. While each department determines the nature of its exercise, the purpose in general is to promote coherence of the student's major program. Each department reports a grade of Pass, or Pass with Distinction, for this exercise.

Phi Beta Kappa, Beta Chapter of Ohio. Phi Beta Kappa, the oldest Greek-letter fraternity in the country, was founded in 1776. The Kenyon chapter was organized in 1858 as an honorary society dedicated to the recognition of scholarly achievement. It is the fourteenth in age of 276 chapters. Elections to membership are made from the best scholars in the junior and senior classes who have shown achievement through grades and an intellectual disposition.

Notes

A student completing a double major has met all the requirements for the major in two departments and passed a Senior Exercise in each. A synoptic major, individually designed by the student to meet his or her special interests, includes work in two or more departments and requires satisfactory completion of one Senior Exercise. An asterisk (*) denotes that the student passed the Senior Exercise with distinction.

Honors Day 2012

Commencement 2012

Kenyon's one hundred eighty-fourth Commencement ceremony features a national leader in making higher education available to disadvantaged students of color, two retiring faculty members with more than sixty years of combined service, and the four hundred young men and women of the Class of 2012 who will parade down Middle Path one last time before taking themselves and their diplomas out into the world.

Depending on the weather, the graduation ceremony is being held either on the lawn between two of the College's oldest academic buildings, Ascension Hall and Samuel Mather Science Hall, or in the Kenyon Athletic Center, a more recent addition to the campus. The Baccalaureate service took place yesterday, on Friday, May 18, at 1:30 p.m.

This year's Baccalaureate speaker, chosen by the seniors, was Associate Professor of Political Science Pamela Camerra-Rowe, incumbent of the College's John B. McCoy Distinguished Teaching Chair. A member of the faculty since 1994, she won Kenyon's highest honor for teaching in 2011 when she was one of two recipients of the Trustee Teaching Excellence Award. In nominating her, students praised her for her high standards and, as one put it, her "feisty energy."

In 2008-09, Camerra-Rowe worked in the U.S. Senate as an American Political Science Association Congressional Fellow. She has drawn on that experience not only in her teaching but also in her longstanding role as an advisor to students seeking careers in government. A graduate of Davidson College, she earned her Ph.D. at Duke University.

Following the Baccalaureate service, the graduating class gathered to partake in a cherished Kenyon tradition, the Senior Sing, which—if the weather cooperated—took place on the steps of Rosse Hall. Commencement Weekend also featured all-campus seminars by Professor of Women's and Gender Studies Laurie Finke, whose topic was "Knights, Lords, and Bands of Brothers: Fraternities and the Romance of the Middle Ages," and Assistant Professor of Physics John "Tom" Giblin, whose session was entitled "Universally Misunderstood: What You Should Know About the Universe Around Us (and How)."

Remarks to the graduating class will be offered by Aileen C. Hefferren, the chief executive of Prep for Prep, a widely admired nonprofit organization that prepares promising students of color in New York City for placement in private schools and lives of leadership. Currently a member of the College's Board of Trustees, she is a summa cum laude graduate of Kenyon in the Class of 1988.

Hefferren has led Prep for Prep since 2002, after having served earlier as the organization's director of operations and director of development. Since its founding in 1978, Prep has enabled nearly three thousand students to attend private day and boarding schools and go on to college. Its alumni have graduated from all of the Ivy League institutions and a wide range of highly selective colleges.

"Focusing resources on the most able students from underserved communities will ultimately create a force of leaders who reflect our country's diversity and who can transform our society for the better," Hefferren has written. "If we as a nation are to achieve a truly representative democracy, students of color must succeed academically and hone their leadership skills at their schools." Every year, Prep for Prep screens talented students who are nominated by more than 750 New York City public schools. The program accepts about 150 fifth graders and 75 seventh graders, who are given fourteen months of rigorous training, including two intensive summer sessions, to prepare them both academically and socially for placement in private schools. The students who successfully complete this preparatory training (typically 75 percent) are placed in day schools as seventh graders or boarding schools as ninth graders.

Last fall, Prep had 756 students enrolled in more than fifty schools, including some of the most prominent names in private secondary education—Dalton, Fieldston, and Horace Mann among day schools; Andover, Choate, and Exeter among boarding schools. Private schools commit more than \$20 million annually to the students in financial aid.

Throughout the students' school careers, Prep for Prep provides counseling, including college counseling, as well as opportunities including internships, career workshops, and service projects. As of last fall, 757 Prep graduates were enrolled in college—of those, 530 were in either Ivy League universities or other highly competitive institutions.

After graduating from the College as a political-science major, Hefferren worked as a research assistant at the U.S. Institute of Peace in Washington, D.C., then as assistant managing editor of *The National Interest*, one of the country's most influential foreign-policy magazines. An active volunteer for Kenyon, she chairs the Diversity Committee of the College's board and serves on its Admissions and Financial Aid, Executive, and Student Affairs committees. In 2008, Kenyon's Alumni Council awarded her its Distinguished Service Award.

The retiring faculty members being honored today are Jean Blacker, a professor of French, and Michael P. Levine, the College's Samuel B. Cummings Jr. Professor of Psychology. Together, they have contributed more than sixty years of subject-area expertise and top-notch teaching, counseling, and administrative skills to the community.

Blacker, who joined the Kenyon faculty in 1985, has taught a wide variety of courses in French language, literature, and film and made notable contributions to her field as a writer and editor. Her primary research interests, which include Anglo-Norman literary and historical texts of the twelfth century, as well as Latin histories of the same era, focus principally on Arthurian material and the Norman Conquest. She is a graduate of the University of California at Los Angeles with a Ph.D. from the University of California at Berkeley.

A member of the faculty since 1979, Levine is an authority on abnormal psychology and the psychology of personality, particularly as they relate to eating disorders. His special interests include the links between eating problems and preventive education, public health, and mass media. Much honored for both his scholarly work and his leadership in advocacy groups dealing with eating disorders, he earned his bachelor's, master's, and doctoral degrees at the University of California at Santa Barbara.

A History of Kenyon Commencements

Kenyon's founder, Bishop Philander Chase, conducted the first Commencement exercises of the College on September 9, 1829, in a large, bare, basement room in the just-completed center section of Old Kenyon, the first permanent building. There were six graduates: G. Dennison, J.B. Chase, A. Blake, S. Chase, P.C. Freeman, and B.B. Sayre.

As soon as Rosse Chapel (later known as Rosse Hall) was completed (about 1840), the ceremonies were moved there; Rosse was the location for all graduation exercises for more than a century. It was in Rosse Chapel on August 3, 1842, that the class valedictorian, Rutherford B. Hayes, a future president of the United States, delivered a Commencement address entitled "College Life."

Until the 1890s, it was customary for each graduating senior to deliver an oration, sometimes in English but often in Latin, Greek, or Hebrew. Since the number of graduates fluctuated from four in 1879 to eighteen in more prosperous years, the programs could sometimes be completed in an afternoon but often took all day, with an hour-and-a-half break for lunch. By 1894, activities connected with Commencement had assumed such large proportions that events started on Sunday and culminated with the graduation exercises on Thursday.

During World War II, the civilian enrollment at Kenyon shrank to about forty students, but President Gordon Keith Chalmers was determined that every Kenyon graduate should still have his moment of glory. So, in December 1943, formal Commencement ceremonies, with the faculty in full academic regalia, were held for two graduates.

The tremendous influx of students coming to Kenyon after World War II under the provisions of the G.I. Bill made graduating classes so large that Rosse Hall could no longer accommodate Commencement audiences. The first outdoor ceremony was held in 1950, in the same location as today's exercises. The rainsite, at first Wertheimer Fieldhouse, became the Ernst Center in 1982. The fieldhouse was demolished in 2003 to make way for the Kenyon Athletic Center; the Ernst Center was razed in 2009. Since 2006, the Kenyon Athletic Center has served as the rainsite.

Every seventeen years, the move outdoors results in exposure to countless millions of uninvited and unwanted visitors—the cicadas that appear on Gambier Hill in late May and early June. The 1965 Commencement was especially plagued by the harmless insects, which dropped from the trees and piled up in great heaps around the tree trunks. The cicadas last returned in 1999, but the onslaught, with its eerie shrilling, didn't peak until after Commencement. Next invasion: 2016.

Kenyon adheres to its classical tradition of conducting the formal part of the Commencement exercises in Latin and printing diplomas in Latin. But it no longer translates the names of the graduates; up until the late 1960s, William became Guliemus and Thomas was transcribed as Thomam.

Academic Costume and Procession

Academic gowns represent a tradition handed down from the universities of the Middle Ages. These institutions were founded by the Church; the students, being clerics, were obliged to wear the prescribed gowns at all times. Round caps later became square mortarboards. The hood, originally a cowl attached to the gown, seems to have had three uses: it could be slipped over the head for warmth, worn as a shoulder cape, or, when hanging from the shoulder, used as a bag in which alms could be collected. It is believed that when large wigs were worn the cape part of the hood was cut open in front and a narrow neckband inserted. The entire garment, cape and hood proper, was allowed to fall back, producing approximately the effect we see today.

In America, the hood is the most outstanding feature. Much of the American academic costume is derived from regalia worn at British universities. The usual color for academic gowns in the United States is black. The bachelor's gown is worn closed; the master's and doctor's may be worn open or closed. The shape of the sleeve is the distinguishing mark of the gowns: bachelor, long pointed sleeve; master, oblong, square cut in back with an arc cut away in front; doctor, bell shaped.

Caps are black, as are the tassels for the bachelor of arts (B.A. or A.B.), bachelor of science (B.S. or Sc.B.), and bachelor of engineering (B.E.) degrees. Tassels for the doctor of philosophy (Ph.D.) degree are gold, while those for other graduate and professional degrees may be of the color corresponding to the trimming on the hoods. Special caps—beefeater caps—are worn at Kenyon by the trustees. This type of cap is also used by some European universities.

Many European universities have distinctive caps and gowns that are different from those commonly used in this country. Some of the gowns are of bright colors, some are embellished with fur. A few of these may be noted in the academic procession today.

The shape and size of the hood marks the college degree of the wearer. The hoods are lined with the color of the institution from which the wearer received his or her degree. The trimming of the collar of the hood is the color that designates the degree: liberal arts, white; fine arts and architecture, brown; science, golden yellow; music, pink; divinity, scarlet; law, purple; engineering, orange; philosophy, blue; medicine, green; public health, salmon; forestry, russet; nursing, apricot. With more than fifteen hundred colleges and universities in the United States, various arrangements of the primary colors are used.

Honorary-degree hoods are distinguished as follows: master of arts (M.A.), white; doctor of humane letters (L.H.D.) and doctor of letters (Litt.D.), white; doctor of science (Sc.D.), golden yellow; doctor of divinity (D.D.), scarlet; doctor of laws (LL.D.), purple; doctor of fine arts (D.F.A.), brown.
