My dear Bishop,

Your telegram and letter were duly received. Mr. Cox's appointment had been already considered by the President on the recommendation of some excellent citizens, and he had decided against it; mainly on the ground of his very unpatronized action in the matter of the Hahnemann. The fact before which it was brought as proposed to a height was really unparliamentary; if the application had been successful a serious collision must have been avoided or the only disappointment; and the act therefore was such a displeasing as it well could be. At any rate the President overlooked it because it was the objection of many of the members of the
