My very dear Lord Remyer.

The arrangement of  
time, and relation to my departure  
for America, is now completed.

Thus — 20. Exeter. June  
3. Bath & Bristol July

16. set sail for America

and may the Good God own  
these appointments as of his  
holy Providence!!

From Mr Higgin I have had  
no letter for several days. His last  
was opposed to my going so soon. I  
like the reasons assigned by me with  
convince him. Yet I should like  
to hear this from his own lips;  
for some how his advice has  
hitherto always proved infallibly  
good.

When I have the pleasure of

redeemable; & he hardly will know  
what to do with the Capital -  
Could we have the use of £100,000

the Institution would be made -  
I am a poor hand to push things es-  
pecially with a friend whom I love  
most especially about Money. I can  
teach & I can pray while money is  
out

out of the question; but when that is  
 mentioned, a whole host of hobgob-  
 bings arise most difficult to slay.  
 Thank God I am rid of these demons  
 of self interest: but other & more severe  
 trials perhaps await me. God give me  
 grace to bear them!

I suppose the good Merrists tell  
 you all the news: as they know  
 all things relating to Ohio that I  
 know what I should say would be  
 stating. One thing they never  
 can tell you Lordship & that is  
 how sincerely and affectionately  
 I am your Lordship's  
 Friend & friend
