I am inex-

I relate the good things which befall
me here. Dr. Thomas, Rector the
Dean of Bristol - Mr. Harford the
Banker. Dr. Mandolph. Dr. Johnson
and nearly all the clergy of Bristol
have called to see me and pledged
their kind services in my favour.

What pleases me not a little is
the expectation of meeting the good
Bishop of St. David's at Mr. Harford's
dinner in a few hours from this.
