IN THE NEWS

President Ford and Jimmy Carter have found one thing to agree on: The election is just too close to call now. Both candidates are winding up their campaigning this week as Americans go to the polls on Nov. 2. Jimmy Carter has accepted a dinner invitation for the annual dinner for Al Smith (the first Roman Catholic to run for President). This will be the last meeting of the two candidates before the election. The Supreme Court yesterday refused to clear the way for Massachusetts to enforce a law requiring parental consent or a court order for abortions on single women under eighteen. The surgeon who removed Sen. Hubert Humphrey's cancerous bladder still believes all the cancerous cells were removed. Treatment will begin shortly with anti-cancer drugs. Many of those American companies identified as participants in the boycott of Israel are complaining that they are frequent trading partners with the nation they are supposedly boycotting. The problem may lie in a confusing definition of the boycott itself.
