

This summer issue of NEWSCOPE, following a precedent established in summers past, is being sent to all returning students. Its major purpose is to give the necessary information about the opening of College in September, but it also offers an opportunity to keep you up-to-date on a variety of collegiate matters. It is being published without the benefit of experienced NEWSCOPE editors, so some of you may find that the amount of news exceeds your interest while others may judge it incomplete. Nevertheless, we hope that this effort will give you a slight sense of what is happening at Kenyon, and what is being planned.

UPPERCLASSMEN REGISTER As announced by the College Calendar (a copy is enclosed)  
ON SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 4 student residences will be open for returning students on  
Saturday, September 3, at 9:00 a.m. The first meal will  
be served that evening between 5:00 and 6:30. Registration for returning students  
will take place on Sunday, September 4. Classes begin Monday, September 5 (Labor Day).

UPPERCLASSMEN MAY NOT RETURN BEFORE SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 3, UNLESS YOU HAVE BEEN  
ASSIGNED TO HELP WITH THE FRESHMAN ORIENTATION PROGRAM.

OPENING The formal Opening of the College will be held at 7:30 p.m., Sunday,  
CONVOCATION September 4, on Samuel Mather Lawn. President Philip H. Jordan will  
officiate. All upperclassmen are especially invited to attend.

CHANGE OF REGULATIONS A new policy concerning COURSE CHANGES will be followed  
FROM THE REGISTRAR'S OFFICE in the Registrar's Office beginning in September. A student  
will still have two weeks at the beginning of each semester  
to make changes in his enrollment via a Course Change Card, having obtained the signature  
of his/her advisor. The difference is that after two weeks, any changes will be subject  
to a special handling fee. This fee will be assessed for each Course Change Card submitted  
after the first two weeks of classes, and is determined by a scale that increases with each  
week. In addition, there will be a charge of \$1 for each course listed on the Course Change  
Card. These fees are assessed both to encourage students to make changes during the first  
two weeks, and to help defray expenses incurred which result from the necessity of making  
special changes. Details will be available at registration time and in the 1977-78 Student  
Handbook.

The Faculty also approved a new policy regarding INCOMPLETES. Beginning this fall, it will  
be the responsibility of the student to request an Incomplete of the Deans, who may approve  
only in case the student experienced a serious illness or personal or family problem which  
prevented completion of a course. Thus, the previous practice of asking an instructor for  
an Incomplete because of the press of other assignments will no longer be approved.

HOUSING If you have not received your Student Housing Agreement for the coming year,  
ASSIGNMENT you will, shortly. Included in the Agreement are items pertaining to room  
assignments, the rental fee, and conditions relating to the use and occupancy  
of those facilities. This year it will be unnecessary for parents of students 18 years of  
age and over to sign the Agreement. Please note that the signed Agreement must be returned  
to the Student Housing Office by August 1.

ACCOUNTING The Accounting Office will be mailing invoices on July 19 for fees and  
OFFICE NOTICE charges for the first semester of the 1977-78 academic year. Payment is  
due on or before August 19.

MOTOR VEHICLE  
REGISTRATION

Students who plan to register a motor vehicle at Kenyon, and did not pick up a registration form before leaving campus, should write to the Campus Security Office and request that the needed form be sent to your home this summer. This will save the bother of sending it home for a signature after you arrive. Some of the Regulations on Student Operation of Motor Vehicles are being revised this summer and will be effective when College opens.

United Parcel Service - The UPS makes a daily visit to Gambier and will deliver your belongings directly to the College. Specifications for packages sent by UPS are as follows:

Maximum load - 100 lbs./day - not to exceed 3 boxes  
Maximum weight - 50 lbs./box  
Maximum size - 108" total of length and girth

UPS automatically insures each package for \$100. The cost for additional insurance is \$.25 for each \$100 worth of insurance.

Greyhound Bus Lines - There is a Greyhound Bus Station in Mount Vernon. Your local bus station should have information about specifications for shipping. If you consider sending your belongings on Greyhound, please note that the College cannot provide transportation for pickup of your belongings.

BUS SERVICE FROM

For the convenience of students arriving by plane, College minibuses will run shuttles to Port Columbus on Saturday and Sunday, September 3 and 4.

No guarantees for accommodating every student can be made, but if you will inform the Activities Secretary when your flight will arrive, it will help our efforts to provide transportation for as many as possible. Upon arrival at Port Columbus, check the Limousine Office near the front door at the Baggage Claim Area. The fare is \$5.00, chargeable to your College account.

STUDENT HEALTH  
SERVICES NOTES

The Student Health Service will be under the administrative direction of Ms. Ann LeBlanc, Health Associate, during 1977-78. Dr. Herbert Sinton, a Family Practitioner, and Dr. Daniel Michel, a specialist in Pediatrics and Adolescent Medicine, will both serve as College Physicians. These Mount Vernon physicians will meet with students by appointment at the Health Service clinic, and will also be on call for emergencies and special consultations. Dr. James J. Wanken, Orthopedic Surgeon, will serve as physician to the varsity football team and will also be available for other athletic team injuries. A Health Service brochure describing all services offered by the Student Health Service will be available in September.



IN MEMORIAM

The Kenyon community was sorrowed by the recent deaths of two of its members.

Joseph S. (Jeff) O'Daniel '79 died on June 26 from injuries received in an automobile accident on June 22. While traveling to his home in Westerville, Ohio, after visiting with a nearby friend, his auto was hit at a main intersection by another auto that ran a red light at a high rate of speed. Jeff was an outstanding scholar, a member of Delta Phi Fraternity, a member of the varsity swimming team and Ohio Conference backstroke champion, and was loved and admired by all who knew him.

James F. Cass, Chief Security Officer at Kenyon since 1962, died on June 29 after a prolonged illness. During his years at Kenyon, Jim Cass worked diligently to improve security and safety procedures on the campus. He was regarded as a friend and benefactor by thousands of Kenyon students, and his dignity and fairness were always respected.

ADMISSIONS OFFICE  
NOTES

A bumper crop of freshmen will be joining the Gambier and Kenyon community on September 1. At the present time there are approximately 185 women and 250 men from 35 states and nine foreign countries in the entering class. In addition, about 20 transfer students have been accepted.

The Admissions staff wishes to express its thanks to all of you who gave so much time and effort last year in assisting our office. The tour guides, the Chase and Hannah More Societies and the Freshman Council were especially helpful throughout the year.

A special thanks also goes to each and every freshman who so willingly agreed to keep a visiting student overnight. During 1976-77 there were more of these visits than ever before, and the great hospitality shown these overnight visitors was a major factor in the success of this year's recruiting efforts.

Visitors, both parents and students, always mention the warmth and openness they feel at Kenyon compared to other campuses they visit. We are frequently told that Kenyon students all seem happy and are smiling and friendly. The atmosphere generated this way makes the admission work much easier and helps the College maintain its standards. Your help and cooperation are truly appreciated.

Assistant Director appointments - Evan Eisner has joined the staff as an Assistant Director of Admissions, replacing Gay Garth who returned to Washington in January. As you know, Evan received his Kenyon A.B. cum laude in May.

Bettye York has been hired as Assistant Director of Admissions, part-time, to take the place of Donna Scott who will devote full attention to the job of Equal Opportunity Coordinator. Mrs. York will handle alumni admissions work. Some of you will remember her from the Student Activities Office.

STUDENT ENROLLMENT, 1977-78

Exact figures are yet to be determined, but it appears that the College will open on September 4 with an enrollment larger than the 1387 students who registered in September 1976. Several factors are responsible for the increase: this year's freshman class of 430 plus is slightly larger than last year's class; fewer students withdrew from the College during the 1976-77 year and during this summer; more students are returning from Off-Campus Study than are going; and nearly 40 students who formerly withdrew have applied to return. Kenyon's largest opening enrollment, about 1450 in both 1974 and 1975, may be exceeded this year.

STAFF NOTES

The following appointments to the College staff have been made for the 1977-78 academic year.

The Rev. Lincoln F. Stelk has recently accepted the position as Rector of Harcourt Parish and will serve as Kenyon College Chaplain. The Reverend Stelk comes to Kenyon from St. Peters Episcopal Church in Delaware, Ohio, and is a graduate of Ohio Wesleyan University and the Episcopal Theological Seminary in Cambridge, Massachusetts. In addition to providing for and scheduling all services in the Church of the Holy Spirit, he will be associated with all campus religious programs and activities. The Reverend and Mrs. Stelk and their two children will reside in the Rectory on Kokosing Drive. Fortunately for Kenyon and Gambier, The Rev. Richard L. Harbour, who this year retired as Rector and Chaplain, will remain with us and has already occupied his new home that has a commanding view on the outskirts of the Village.

Ms. Corlin Henderson will begin her duties as Assistant Dean of Students on August 1. Ms. Henderson, a graduate of Colgate University, comes to Kenyon from the University of Vermont where she received an M.A. degree in Student Personnel in Higher Education this spring. Ms. Henderson will share general dean's responsibilities with Dean Edwards for upperclass students, and will give specific administrative attention to women's programs, student organizations and clubs, collegiate programs, and special events. Dean Henderson's office will be on the first floor of the Student Affairs Center, and she will reside in the Gund Hall apartment. Ms. Carol Klein, who has replaced Ms. Georgiene Radlick as Activities Secretary, will serve also as secretary to the Assistant Dean of Students.

Dr. Wayne O'Brien, who worked at Smythe House on an interim basis from March until the end of the second semester, has been appointed to the position of College Counselor. Dr. O'Brien is a 1968 graduate of Kenyon who took his advanced degrees in counseling psychology at Bowling Green and Toledo Universities. He is eager to meet students in a number of different contexts and is planning some interesting new programs for next year.

Mr. A. Leon Delano is the new director of the Computer Center and comes to Kenyon from Central Ohio Technical College. Mr. Delano holds both the B.S. and M.S. degrees in Aeronautical Engineering and brings experience with digital computers from the gas compression industry. Mr. Delano, his wife and two children reside in Mount Vernon.

Mr. Arnold E. Hamilton has been appointed Chief Security Officer. He has been associated with Kenyon College for more than four years and students will remember his services in the past as a member of the Security Office.

DEVELOPMENT OFFICE NOTES The Development Office, which is responsible for the College's fund-raising programs, reports that for the first time in Kenyon's history we have gone over the \$2 million mark in total gifts from all sources in a single year. Fifty-two per cent of all alumni (one of the highest percentages among colleges in the nation) have contributed through the Kenyon Fund and the \$209,000 goal was exceeded. The Parents' Fund has achieved a record high of over \$75,000 with gifts from more than 660 parents. A full report will be included in the September Alumni Bulletin.

ALUMNI OFFICE NOTES The weekend of May 27-29 was Kenyon's first combined Commencement-Alumni Reunion in ten years. Close to 2,000 people were on campus, including over 500 alumni, for the event-filled occasions. All participants agreed that the two events held on the same weekend was successful, indeed.

During 1976-77 the Kenyon Alumni Association had one of its busiest and most gratifying years ever. Under the leadership of William C. Williams '54, the Association sponsored, in addition to the Alumni Fund (see Development Notes above), numerous programs such as Alumni Day, the Extern Program, the Professional Alumni Visitation Program, Resume and Interview Workshops, and, of course, the Reunion Weekend in May.

The Extern Program, jointly sponsored by the Alumni Association and the After Kenyon Library, provides an opportunity for juniors to "try out" a career they are considering by spending a week at spring break on the job with an alumnus who is in that particular field.

MAINTENANCE DEPARTMENT NOTES The Seitz House, at the corner of Wiggin and Park Streets, which is being renovated to house the History Department, will be completed on August 1. To combat the energy crises, the College is installing a 20,000 gallon reserve oil tank and retubing four boilers for more efficient operation. An Energy Task Force has been organized, which consists of Engineers and College personnel, to provide an energy saving program not only for the present, but also for future planning.

Construction on the new Hill Theater began on July 5.

DECISION ON SLEEPING PLATFORMS On June 24 a special meeting was held to consider the advisability of permitting the use of constructed wooden sleeping platforms in student residences. The twelve persons attending included members of the administrative staff, Kenyon students, insurance company representatives, and state and local fire officials. All aspects of the topic were discussed and alternatives were explored. It was clear to all, by the end of the discussion, that the only prudent and safe course of action for the College to follow is to prohibit the existence of sleeping platforms composed of combustible materials. While this decision may not be a popular one for some students, the College made it solely upon the consideration of safety for students in their residences.

FELLOWSHIPS AND POSTGRADUATE OPPORTUNITIES Included in this mailing for members of the senior class is a letter from Professor Thomas Short, Chair of the Committee on Awards and Postgraduate Opportunities, that details various awards and fellowships for which graduating seniors may apply during the fall. Need for further information or questions may be directed to Dean Edwards' office.

Two new faculty members have joined the Department of Anthropology/Sociology for 1977-78. PSYCHOLOGY  
DEPARTMENT  
NOTES

During the coming year, Professor Allan Fenigstein of the Psychology Department will be on a leave of absence at the University of Virginia to do research in social psychology. For the year that he is gone, Ms. Sally Lu Wilson will be teaching Professor Fenigstein's sections of Psychology 11-12 and his course in Abnormal Psychology (Psychology 37). Ms. Wilson is currently finishing her dissertation research at Purdue University. She will also be teaching a course second semester in one of her interest areas, which include moral development, sex roles and androgyny, and religious development. Professor Fenigstein's other courses will not be offered until he returns in 1978-79.

POLITICAL SCIENCE  
DEPARTMENT NOTES

The Department of Political Science has not yet hired an American public policy specialist, and has extended the search into 1977-78. This has required cancellation for next year of PSci 50, "Problems of American Democracy," and PSci 92, "Urban Politics." (PSci 11-12 or PSci 27 might be substituted for the first, and Anth 91(2) or Econ 73 for the second.)

Mr. Horwitz, who was asked by President Jordan to revitalize the Public Affairs Conference Center, has already undertaken, along with the Development Office, a fund-raising campaign for the purpose, and hopes to sponsor the first conference under the new program in 1978-79.

The latest volume in the Kenyon Public Affairs Series, published by the University Press of Virginia, will be released in August. Based on the Bicentennial Conference of the KPAF in 1975 and 1976, the volume was edited by Mr. Horwitz and is entitled The Moral Foundations of the American Republic.

Six members of the Department Faculty will attend the annual meetings of the American Political Science Association in Washington, D.C. early in September, and three of them - Messrs. Agresto, Clor and Scorza - are on the program. Mr. Melanson has taken over the Kenyon pre-law advising job from Mr. Trethewey. Mr. Frame succeeds Mr. Clor as Chair of the Department on July 1.



ALL-AMERICANS Timothy P. Appleton '77, selected to numerous basketball All-America teams this spring, won additional acclaim with the recent announcement of the College Sports Information Directors of America Academic All-America Team. Tim was a first team selection. In case you missed the news release, Tim was drafted by the Detroit Pistons in the recent NBA player draft. He was selected in the Piston's final round and, thus, becomes the fifth Kenyon basketball player to earn a shot at a pro basketball career.

Congratulations to the seven Kenyon swimmers who were recently named All-Americans by the NCAA as a result of their performances in the Division III National Championships at Oberlin College last March: Donald M. Constantino '77, Timothy M. Bridgham '79, Peter C. Dolan '80, Timothy G. Glasser '80, Samuel C. Lund '79, Stephen M. Penn '80, James L. Robrock '78. The Kenyon team placed third in the national championships.
