Midsummer greetings from the land of serenity. Gambier has been enjoyably tranquil since that busy Commencement/Alumni Weekend--surely a contrast to those event filled months from January to May. Imagine, no demonstrations, riots, or fires; not even waiting lines at the post office or the Village Market. Surprisingly, the elements and the utility companies have also been behaving, except for the scheduled replacement of the Gambier water system. A new main waterline is being laid along Rt. 229 from the Mt. Vernon reservoir to Gambier. All the Village waterlines are being replaced so ditches now appear on every street to serve pipelines to all residences and buildings. This undertaking also includes a new water tower that workmen are desperate to get in place before the old one collapses. The new water system, now owned by the Village, replaces the one that has been owned and operated by the College since Philander dug the first well. Everything should be in place, with water flowing, by the time you return.

Progress in Gambier isn't quite confined to the new water system, however. A number of campus and community projects are underway this summer, as are other collegiate developments and changes. If you consider sending your belongings on Greyhound, please note that the College cannot provide transportation for pickup of your belongings. Greyhound will hold your baggage in Mt. Vernon for three days without charge and up to fifteen days at \$.50 per day.

CO-OP BOOKSTORE The Co-op Bookstore is managed by Kenyon students for the benefit of Kenyon students. You can save from 25% to 75% on your textbook expenses when you buy books from the Co-op.

SCHEDULED EVENTS AND Each year we have more events scheduled on campus. During the THE CAMPUS ACTIVITIES 1976-77 year there were 2,739 events scheduled. In 1977-78 there CALENDAR were 3,132, including 163 films, 75 lectures, 81 musical and dance performances, 25 poetry readings and 199 athletic events. As the

number of scheduled events increase so do conflicts in regard to time and space. To help remedy this situation the College is instituting two new scheduling procedures which we hope will result in a more comprehensive and better planned activities calendar. First, the Assistant Dean of Student's approval will be needed before any event is entered on the Activities Calendar. Second, each month, sometime during the third week, there will be a calendar planning session. Persons who are planning programs will be urged to attend, especially representatives from the major programming groups: Mr. Robert Daniel, the newly appointed Director of Lectureships and College Convocations; Student Lectureships; Social Board; organizers of Department lectures, etc. At these meetings the calendar for the next month will be made final. Requests to schedule events after the month's calendar has been set will not normally be accepted. Further explanation of these procedures will be made when the College year begins.

DEPARTMENTAL NOTES

Faculty Seminar - Thirty members of the faculty participated in the fourth faculty seminar from June 5 to June 16 in Gambier. Led by <u>Professors Rita Kipp</u>, <u>Richard Hettlinger</u>, and <u>Owen York</u>, the seminars were designed to draw members of the faculty into discussion of the essential principles and modes of liberal education. The seminars involved intensive sessions daily from 9:30 until 4:00 and some heavy reading of dense texts, including Darwin's Origin of Species.

<u>Art Department</u> - On a fellowship from the National Endowment for the Humanities, <u>Mr. Eugene</u> <u>Dwyer will attend the seminar, American Art and the Classical Tradition, at the University</u> of Illinois for the remainder of the summer. <u>Mr. Martin Garhart</u> has had a steady schedule of exhibitions throughout the country during the year, the latest being in the Boston Printmakers National Exhibit. <u>Mr. Barry Gunderson</u> continues to exhibit in invitational shows throughout the country and it has been announced that he won the competition for a public sculpture in Portsmouth, Ohio. <u>Mr. Mark Levy</u> is studying Chinese art history at the Uniwersity of Kansas throughout the summer. <u>Ms. Patricia McCulloh</u> is putting the finishing touches on the year-long project of building a studio in her home. <u>Mr. Joseph Slate</u> exhibited his works on paper in the Museum of Arts and History in Port Huron, Michigan, during June. He and his wife, Patty, will spend a short time in Italy sometime in July.

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<u>Art Dept. - cont.</u> We are sorry to report that <u>Ms. Carla Steiger</u> has left the community to join her husband in Michigan. <u>Ms. Florence Lord</u> reports that a full schedule of exhibits in Colburn Gallery for next year is fairly well completed. It is anticipated that Kenyon will participate in the national salute to Pompeii by having an exhibit on Pompeii in January 1979. Everyone is urged to obtain a calendar of events from the Gallery in the fall. Ms. Lord will attend a seminar, "A Look at Modern Sculpture", in Washington, D. C..

<u>Biology Department</u> - There will be an additional section of Bio 62, Experimental Animal Behavior, that should accommodate most students who were closed out. See <u>Mr. Burns</u> when you return. As usual, some students are working with individual faculty members - <u>Michelle</u> <u>Browner</u> '79, is in Gambier, <u>Sandy Lane</u> '79 is at the Duke Marine Lab, and two recent graduates, <u>Geoff Back</u> '78 and <u>Mike Manhart'78</u> are also at DML. <u>Mr. Burns</u> is leading groups on nature tours from such far away places as Maine, and hopefully Alaska; <u>Mr. Robert Dean</u> and <u>Mr. T. Jegla</u> are heading the Kenyon contingent at DML; <u>Mr. Edwards</u> is doing research at Yale; <u>Ms. Dorothy Jegla</u> and <u>Mr. J. Richard Stallard</u> are "holding down the fort" in Gambier; and Mr. Francis Yow is in Massachusetts.

<u>Classics Department</u> - <u>Mr. Daniel Clift</u> and <u>Kim Stapleton '74</u> were married in Flossmoor, Illinois, on July 1st. Having earlier in the year declined an attractive academic appointment, Mr. Clift has joined the National Refractory Company in Cleveland. <u>Mr. Robert Bennett</u> and <u>Mr. Clifford Weber</u> are still working away at a backlog of paper work, and the latter is struggling to get construction of his house off the ground. Despite the balmy weather, Mr. William McCulloh's gaze remains fixed on Pseudo-Dionysius the Areopagite. Even more obscure is the Byzantine subject of <u>Ms. Martha Vinson</u>, who works on her dissertation at home in Louisville.

Economics Department - <u>Mr. Maurice N. Marchon</u>, of Economics has joined the faculty of Economics at the University of Montreal and now resides atop a high rise overlooking Mont Royale.

English Department - Mr. Gerald Duff will be at Rice University in Houston, Texas, on a N. E. H. Fellowship this summer and Mr. Robert Daniel is studying, relaxing and researching in Sewanee, Tennessee.

<u>Modern Foreign Languages</u> - <u>Mr. Robert Goodhand</u> is returning from a sabbatical leave and will assume the Chair of the Department of Modern Foreign Languages and Literatures. <u>Ms. Barbara Cooper</u> has resigned from the staff to accept another position. She has been replaced by <u>Ms. Pierina Carcich</u>. Students who pre-registered for French 71 and 72 will be pleased to learn that Ms. Carcich will offer that course on the French novel with relatively few changes in content and format. She will also be teaching Intermediate French and Introduction to French Literature. <u>Mr. Edward Harvey</u> is spending his summer in Friendship, Maine and Fredericton, New Brunswick and <u>Mr. Bruce Haywood</u>, Provost has been in England for three weeks in June and July visiting his family. <u>The New Language Laboratory</u> (Ascension 102), comprising ten learning stations, is ready for use and there will be an open house in early September to put on display this welcome addition to the language program. Students are advised to bring to campus their own cassette recorders, but it should be noted that there will be some curtailment of the loan of cassette tapes in favor of their use in the language lab itself.

<u>Music Department</u> - The College has appointed <u>Mr. Daniel V. Robinson</u> to fill the position formerly occupied by Helen Walker, who resigned in January during a leave of absence. Robinson, who holds the A. B. from Harvard, the M. A. in Musicology and the D. M. A. in Conducting from Stanford, will direct the Kenyon Choir and during the current year will teach Elements of Music, Fundamentals of Music Theory and Form and Analysis. <u>Ms. Robinson</u> will be available for instruction in violin and will perform a recital at Kenyon with Lois Brehm, pianist, in late October. <u>Douglas Starr</u>, who joined the Department in March as a part-time instructor, will teach the beginning courses in composition: 17 (Counterpoint) and 18 (Harmony). He will also be available for instruction in voice. Starr will receive the D.M.A. in Theory and Composition from The Ohio State University in August. A slightly revised list of courses will include one new seminar each semester, Music 71 and 72, in which historical and theoretical aspects of major works will be explored in depth. Before College opens, the Department of English will have moved from Ascension Hall to their new home in remodeled Sunset Cottage, where there will also be the office of the Kenyon Review.

Nu Pi Kappa, which has housed most of the members of the Department of English for many years, will later this year be remodeled to become a study lounge for students. A grant from the Ohio Historical Association will enable the College to restore Nu Pi Kappa to its original state, much like Philomathesian.

The Department of Mathematics will move this summer from its present locations in the Biology building and Samuel Mather into Ascension Hall. With the departure of the English Department faculty, there will be some other relocating of faculty offices in Ascension. The College will consolidate its printing and duplicating services in the basement of Ascension.

In order to provide the Department of Anthropology and Sociology with needed space in Bailey House, the two <u>Art Historians</u>, Professors Dwyer and Levy, will move their office into the Biology building. The Biology auditorium will be equipped with twin projectors so that Art History classes may be conducted in that larger space.

<u>KENYON REVIEW</u> - The Board of Trustees has given the official go-ahead for reviving publication of the long anticipated, new <u>Kenyon Review</u>. Editors Frederick Turner and Ronald Sharp, both of the English department, intend to make the Review "the best literary magazine in the country."

A new athletic training room is being constructed in Wertheimer Fieldhouse this summer that will provide services for both men and women athletes. It will be located at the east end of the fieldhouse at an area made available by alteration of a lockerroom.

FIRE DRILL - On July 9 the Gambier Fire Department conducted a fire drill by burning the house on Wiggin Street that sat immediately south of Gund Commons and north of the Pirates Cove. The lot has been made available for the building of the new Fire House which will begin construction soon.

The Pirates Cove has been busy this summer constructing a new room that will enlarge their establishment.

ADMISSIONS OFFICE NOTES - In the spring, rumors were rampant in Gambier that we would have the largest freshman class ever, and that things were going to be very crowded in the dormitories in September. However, the entering class is almost identical in size to last September's entering class. As of June 20th there were 427 freshmen. The breakdown between men and women is 199 women and 228 men. In addition, there will be about a dozen transfers. Opening enrollment will exceed 1450.

<u>Physics Department</u> - The Natural Philosophy course taught by <u>Mr. Thomas Greenslade</u> in Period VI is now being offered as two independent semester courses which may be taken singly or in either order. Physics 1 deals with models of light and with wave Phenomena. Physics 2 is an examination of the idea of energy and how it developed, with readings from the original literature. Both courses have experiments and demonstrations as integral parts of the inquiry. There is room for a few more students in Physics 31 (Electronics) taught during the first semester by <u>Mr. Peter Collings</u>. The course consists of two lectures a week during Per. B and one laboratory on either Wednesday or Thursday afternoon. Prerequisites: Phys 11, 12 and Math 11, 12. Summer plans for <u>Mr. Greenslade</u>, <u>Jr.</u> include the month of June in England and Scotland visiting science museums and photographing apparatus. After two weeks in Maine, visiting at the New England Music Camp, he will bicycle back to Gambier, visiting friends on the way.

<u>Psychology Department</u> - Kenyon Faculty are authors of two of the 18 papers that were accepted by the Division of Experimental Psychology for reading at the 1978 Annual Convention of the American Psychological Association in Toronto at the end of August. <u>Mr. Ronald Heyduk</u> will present a paper entitled "Muller-Lyer and Ponzo illusion: Effects of depth cue reduction." Mr. Richard Hoppe's paper is "The effect of unsuccessful cues on unremembered traces."

Political Science Department - Because Kenyon's new Public Affairs Conference Program will require a good deal of attention next year from Mr. Robert Horwitz and Ms. Elizabeth Hansot, the College has hired Mr. Wayne Ambler from Boston College for 1978-79 to teach two sections of Political Science 1-2. Political Science 28, Basic Problems of American Democracy, (taught first semester by Mr. Elliott) has changed its course description to include a section on the rise of the women's movement as part of the study of equality in American democracy. The class will read a book which compares the women's movement to the civil rights movement and relates both to the question of equality. Mr. John Elliott will complete his sabbatical semester of research and writing about Congress and Congressional elections with two weeks of research in Washington, D. C. Mr. Robert Horwitz is spending the summer in Oxford to bring to fruition his study of Locke's education policy. Mr. Thomas Scorza has begun the study of Melville he has planned for 1978-79 when he will be on leave from the College. He is also awaiting the publication in the Fall of his first book on the subject. Mr. Richard Melanson is writing a paper on the International Labor Organization which he will read at the annual meeting: of the American Political Science Association in New York early in September. Mr. Kirk Emmert, who will be joining the faculty full-time this Fall, is finishing a book-length manuscript on Winston Churchill and the idea of empire. Ms. Elisabeth Hansot is finishing two articles on bureaucratic organization in the modern state, one of which means to discover a role for humor in bureaucratic organizations. Mr. Harold Clor will use a part of the summer to design the project in the field of legal ethics that he will pursue during his sabbatical leave in 1979-80. Mr. William Shapiro is spending the summer in Gambier bringing his dissertation on Nietzsche and Weber into shape for publication. Mr. William Frame is spending the summer at the University of Georgia in Athens studying the idea of privacy in the liberal tradition.

Summer Plans of Other Faculty -Mr. Donald Cass (Chemistry), National Outdoor Leadership School in Wyoming and will lead Kenyon's Wilderness Program to Wyoming; Mr. Ronald McLaren (Philosophy), conference on Wittginstein in Kirchber on Wechset (Austria) two weeks in Vienna learning about Wittginstein's cultural background, rest of summer continuing his work on ethics; Ms. Rita Kipp (Anthropology-Sociology), in Gambier most of the summer; Mr. Denis Baly (Religion), Greece visiting monasteries of Mount Athos and Major classical and Minoan sites, in June and Britain in July.

CONSTRUCTION, REMODELING, AND OFFICE MOVES The Bolton Theater should be ready for occupancy in October. The theater was named for Mr. Kenyon Bolton, a member of the Kenyon Board of Trustees and long-time friend of the College, who gave the amount needed to complete the funding. The official opening of Bolton Theater is set for the weekend

of December 8, 1978 when the production, a new play by a nationally known playwright, will be presented. The play will be produced by Ted Walsh '63 and directed by Paul Newman '49. Newman will select the cast and be in residence in Gambier during the time of rehearsal.
