## In the News

After a malfunction due both to human and mechanical error, the Three Mile Island nuclear power plant reactor remains stable and is continuing to cool. However, problems still remain with the hydrogen bubble (15-20' in diameter) within the reactor. If not removed, the bubble could lead to a vapor lock and a subsequent "melt-down" of the uranium core and the reactor itself, emitting huge amounts of lethal radiation. Technicians expect to be able to control the condition of the reactor, and no general evacuation of nearby residents has begun. However, the entire area is on alert.

Last Monday's signing of the peace treaty between Israel and Egypt was the catalyst which finally brought all but two Arab nations together to sanction Egypt both politically and economically. Accusing Sadat of sacrificing the total Arab cause for a peace with Israel, the Arab nations finally pressured Saudi Arabia, a leading economic ally of Egypt, into joining the boycott.
