#### DEPARTMENTAL NOTES

<u>Anthropology/Sociology Department</u> - <u>Ms. Rita Kipp</u> will spend a month this summer in the Netherlands. Three weeks will be spent in Breukelen taking an intensive course in Dutch language and culture. Approximately one week will be spent exploring the libraries and archives in Holland in anticipation of a future research project. <u>Mr. John Macionis</u> plans to spend the summer in Gambier completing preparation for a discussion of undergraduate teaching at an upcoming meeting of the American Sociological Association and working toward completion of six chapters of a text in urban sociology, forthcoming from St. Martins Press.

<u>Art Department - Mr. Eugene Dwyer</u> reports that changes in the Art Department curriculum will be in effect with the fall semester. Some changes are in the foundation courses (Art History 41-42 and Studio Art 1 and Art 2), but the biggest changes are coming in the intermediate level of instruction in Art History and in the Advanced Studio courses. <u>Ms. Florence Lord</u> announces that Colburn Gallery will open the first semester with a faculty show, exhibiting works of the new members as well as that of <u>Mr. Slate</u> and <u>Mr. Gunderson</u>. All are invited to attend the Opening Reception in the Gallery immediately after the Formal Opening of the College, August 29. <u>Ms. Linda Mahoney</u> will receive her M.A. in Photography and Cinema from Ohio State University in June. In September she will be teaching and completing an M.F.A. at the Rhode Island School of Design.

<u>Biology Department</u> - <u>Mr. Francis Yow</u> will be doing some research and reading at the Marine Biological Laboratory in Woods Hole, Massachusetts. The remainder of the summer will be spent at the Yow's summer home in nearby Falmouth.

Chemistry Department - Mr. Russell Batt is attending a summer workshop on Computers in Chemical Education, sponsored by the American Chemical Society, concentrating on the application of computer graphics in chemical education. Mr. Don Cass has accepted a teaching position at College of the Atlantic, Bar Harbor, Maine. He is leaving Gambier around July 1. He would like to hear from Kenyon and Gambier friends, and he says "stop in if you are nearby." Mr. Gordon Johnson attended the Lilly Endowment workshop on evaluation in Colorado Springs from July 1 to 18. The session is designed to encourage faculty members to be interested in the evaluation of instructional programs and in those processes which, in any institution, lead to decisions about the expansion or reduction in activities. Mr. James M. Pappenhagen will be working on the revision and writing of analytical methods to appear in the 16th edition of Standard Methods for the Examination of Water and Wastewater. Also, in the interest of better management and efficiency, he has assured all that he will clean off the top of his Mr. Owen York served as Assistant Director of Reading for the Advanced Placement desk! Program, Educational Testing Service and attended meetings in Princeton, New Jersey from June 6 to 16. He also attended the National Organic Symposium in Tuscon, Arizona from June 22 to 26.

<u>Drama Department</u> - <u>Mr. James Michael</u>, Professor Emeritus, is working full-time as an actor for Shakespeare and Company, a summer theater in Washington, D.C. directed by Ted Walch, Kenyon '63. Jim will play leading roles in THE MATCHMAKER, SEE HOW THEY RUN and ANGEL STREET. <u>Mr. Thomas Turgeon</u> will direct DAMES AT SEA and act in THE ODD COUPLE at the Weston Playhouse, Weston, Vermont. <u>Ms. Stacey Temple</u> will choreograph and perform in a dance concert at the Changing Scene Theater in Denver, Colorado. <u>Ms. Harlene Marley</u> is participating in a National Endowment for the Humanities Summer Seminar at Princeton University. <u>Mr. Dan Parr</u> and Ms. Suzanne Dougan are cultivating their gardens in Gambier.

Economics Department - Beginning in the spring of 1980, Mr. Carl Brehm will offer, to seniors only, Economics 13, "Economic Principles and Public Policy," an introductory course presenting the basic concepts of economic analysis and applying them to current economic problem subjects such as inflation, unemployment, energy, natural resources, and the environment. To permit more Kenyon students to learn to combine mathematics and economics, Mr. David Hall has made Econometrics a "normal course" accessible to all interested students and he has introduced (as an alternative to Mathematical Economics 54) Econ 91, a largely independent study course in mathematical economics, much of the work of which can be done over the summer. Interested students should talk with or write to Professor Hall. Mr. Richard Trethewey will lead students into one of the new areas in a fall seminar, "The Economic Analysis of Politics and Law." A few places are still available in that course. During the summer, Mr. Bruce Gensemer continues to work as a Fellow in Economics and Public Finance in the Academy for Contemporary Problems. He is Project Director for the Ohio School Finance Study which attempts to predict the effects of various reform alternatives. The Harvard Institute for International Development has invited Mr. Alan Batchelder to serve as a consultant to the Economic Planning Unit of the Government of Malaysia. The Unit will undertake a study of the character and extent of urban poverty and the effects of government programs upon the incidence of poverty. Mr. Batchelder is in Kuala Lumpur advising the Minister of Planning about the structure of the study. He will return for fall classes.

English Department - Mr. Ronald Sharp will be editing The Kenyon Review and the Norton Critical Edition of Keats this summer.

<u>History Department</u> - History 77, "The Renaissance of the Twelfth Century," will meet for the first time on Wednesday, September 5 at 2:00 p.m. in the Seitz House seminar room. Students unable to attend, contact Ms. Cadden before then (Seitz #5, PBX 2320).

<u>IPHS</u> - Any upperclass students who wish to enroll in IPHS as sophomores in the Fall, and who have not already been accepted in the Program should write to the Director, <u>Mr. Richard</u> <u>Hettlinger</u>, and talk with him immediately on arrival in Gambier. Although enrollment is limited, it is quite possible that there will be room for some additions at the beginning of the semester.

Modern Foreign Languages and Literatures - The offering MFLL 21,22 ("The Image of Woman: European Crosscurrents") will be postponed until 1980-81. As was planned for next year, the course in 1980-81 will be a year's study of various images of woman projected in some of the classics of European literature (in translation) from the time of the troubadors to the contemporary. Contingent upon vagaries of staffing, these instructors will team-teach the class in 1980-81: Ms. Pierina Carcich (French and Italian Lit.); Mr. Robert Goodhand (French Lit.); Mr. Bruce Haywood and Mr. Edmund Hecht (German Lit.); Ms. Linda Metzler (Spanish Lit.); and Ms. Maryanne Ward (Russian Lit.). French 92, "Special Topics," is a newly created interdisciplinary seminar (TBA in the spring semester of next year) designed both for French majors and non-majors with a reading knowledge of French who wish to tune up their French skills by engaging in guided research complimentary to their studies in their different disciplines. Juniors and seniors with interests or research projects in areas where original French sources are of critical importance are particularly welcome. Taking account of the different disciplinary perspectives represented, primary attention in the seminar(s) will be given to the question of what constitutes, culturally speaking, the distinctively "French." Secondary attention may be given to the value and validity of structuralist methodology applied to a variety of disciplines. Given the nature of the course, students might well consider electing it as a fifth course on a Sat/Unsat basis. The option will probably be available for discussion in English or French, depending upon the oral competence and desires of those enrolled.

Music Department - Mr. Paul Posnak, newly appointed Assistant Professor of Music, will teach piano, second year theory, composition and a 20th century course for the non-major which is expected to reflect Mr. Posnak's keen interest in jazz and in recent compositional techniques. The Music Department is pleased to announce the reorganization of the choral program. A new, select group, the Kenyon College Chamber Singers has been formed for which a few spaces remain to be filled. Auditions will be in the Fall. This group will tour the East Coast in the Spring. The Kenyon College Choir is being expanded in order to perform the great works for chorus and orchestra. It will meet Wednesday evenings and will perform the Mozart Requiem in the Fall. All interested students are urged to join. Apply to the Department for further information. There will be a chamber orchestra next year which will perform the repertoire for small orchestra. Student soloists will be sought actively and at least two full concerts will be given. The Gund Concerts for 1979-80 will include the Jongleurs, performers of Medieval and Renaissance music (September 28); the Tokyo String Quartet (October 19); and Orpheus, a 25-piece orchestra from New York (February 7). A number of concerts and recitals by students and faculty are planned for the Fall. Those interested in script writing for the Kenyon Musical Review should get the creative juices flowing and submit their name to the SAC Music Club box; watch for a September organizational meeting. After attending a viol workshop in New York in June, Mr. Kenneth Taylor will spend the summer planning two new courses, locating fresh repertory for the Gambier Baroque Ensemble and redecorating his house. Mr. Daniel Robinson will be in the San Francisco Bay area in July and August preparing to conduct the South Bay Chamber Orchestra at Stanford University and at Old First Center for the Arts in a concert including three world premiers. Works by Martin Bresnick of Yale, Jack Gallagher of Wooster, and Michael McNabb of Stanford will be performed.

Philosophy Department - Mr. Donald Algeo will be a National Endowment in the Humanities Fellow from June 15-August 15, 1979 in Berkeley, California, studying Contemporary European Philosophy. Mr. Cyrus W. Banning is attending the NEH Summer Seminar for College Teachers in Contemporary Moral Issues conducted by Professor Richard Wasserstrom (philosophy and law) at UCLA. From June 1979 until July 1980, Mr. Ronald McLaren will be Resident Director of the GLCA-ACM Japan Studies Program at Waseda University in Tokyo and will teach courses in Ethics in the International Division and in the School of Literature at that University. His address is Gaijin in Shukusha #2, Waseda University, I-70 Totsuka-machi, Shinjuku-ku, Tokyo 160. Those who wish to get a headstart for Existentialism (Phil 41) should read Nietzsche's Beyond Good and Evil (Random House, 1966) and Kierkegaard's Concluding Unscientific Postscript (Princeton Univ. Press, 1968) especially part Two, chapters I and II. <u>Physics Department - Mr. Thomas Greenslade</u> will be doing research this summer at The Smithsonian Institute in Washington on the development of physics teaching apparatus in the nineteenth century. During the Fall he will continue work on a book on this subject. The Physics Department will offer a revised version of Physics I during the second semester in place of the Physics II course originally announced. The course, which will have a limited enrollment, will deal with the physical principles behind the creative use of light and sound. Copies of a tentative syllabus for the course may be obtained by mail from Professor Greenslade. During the spring semester, the Physics Department will offer a new course entitled "Earth Physics." This course requires no previous work in physics and will be taught by <u>Mr. Peter Collings</u>. Basic physics will be introduced as the present state of our knowledge of the earth is explored. Two physics majors, Roger Ikeda and Katherine Yukich, are staying in Gambier this summer to conduct research into the properties of liquid crystals. Their work is sponsored by a grant to Kenyon College from the Research Corporation. Mr. Collings is supervising their activities.

Political Science Department - The Political Science faculty has finally identified the five books which constitute the bibliography for the new Integrating Exercise option. The difficult problem was to find good biographies or autobiographies describing different kinds of leadership in different regimes that were actually available in affordable editions. The final selections are: Bertram D. Wolfe, <u>Three Who Made a Revolution</u> (Dell); R. Tames, <u>Disraeli</u> (Viking); P. Magnus, <u>Gladstone</u> (J. Murray); J. M. Burns, <u>Roosevelt: The</u> Lion and the Fox (Harbrace); Xenophon, The Education of Cyrus (Harvard).

<u>Religion Department</u> - The Department was unable to make a successful appointment in Eastern religious traditions after extensive search and interviewing. It has been decided to leave the post vacant for the coming year and to conduct a fresh search beginning in the Fall. Students requiring work in non-western religions are invited to consult with Mr. Rogan about independent study possibilities, and any student hoping to gain his/her first exposure to these traditions is reminded that Rel 11, 12 includes a significant section on Indian and Chinese religion, on Islam, and on "primitive" religion. In October, the Department will sponsor an outstanding Larwill Lecturer in Professor John Eaton of the University of Birmingham, in England. Widely published in Old Testament Studies, particularly in interpretation of the Psalms, Professor Eaton will give two leactures on "Meaning of the Psalms Today." Finally, it has been decided that Rel 13, 14, God and Man in the Bible, will not be offered in its present form after the coming academic year. Discussion with majors and other students of the biblical courses in the Department will take place during the year as part of a process of reorganizing our offerings in that area. For 1979-80 it will be taught by Professor Baly and students who wish to take it as presently constituted should plan to take it this year.

Consider registering for the program, which gives you the chance to spend a week of Spring Break with an alumnus/alumna, parent, or friend of the College who is in an occupation of interest to you. <u>Sophomores</u>: Summer is a good time for doing "information interviews," asking people about their jobs to help you learn more about occupations which might interest you. For suggestions about questions to ask and how to get started, send a postcard requesting the handout, "Information Interviews" to the CDC.

NEW COMPUTER<br/>SYSTEMKenyon is installing a computer-graphics system this summer that will<br/>be available for use when College resumes this fall. The system will<br/>consist of one CRT terminal and one pen plotter and should be particularly<br/>interesting to the science and political science students. Also added are two statistical<br/>analysis packages which are already being extensively used.

<u>A REPORT FROM THE</u> The Class of 1983 which joins us on August 26 looks strong and plentiful. <u>ADMISSIONS OFFICE</u> It was another gratifying year for Admissions; the Class numbers about 410 freshmen and 18 transfer students from a wide geographic range.

Special thanks for a great deal of help throughout the year goes to the Freshman Council, the Kokosingers, the Hannah More Society, the Chase Society and the Admissions tour guides. It is always a pleasure to hear prospective students and their parents comment on the gracious and considerate help all our students give campus visitors. There is an attitude and a pride very evident that is missing on many campuses.

DEVELOPMENT<br/>OFFICEThe Development Office reports an unusually successful year for annual<br/>giving. The Kenyon Fund climbed to \$292,730 with gifts from 3000 alumni,<br/>and the Parents Fund reached a new high of more than \$97,000 with 625parents contributing. In addition, new and increased gifts from parents earned a matching

grant of \$25,000 from the Joyce Foundation.

POST-GRADUATE<br/>FELLOWSHIPS ANDSeniors: Some reminders about applications. There are a number of post-<br/>graduate fellowships for which seniors must apply by the end of September.SCHOLARSHIPS<br/>Nodes, and Watson) was circulated to all members of the class of 1980 in

April. If you intend to apply for any of these awards, you are urged to review this information and begin thinking about your application before you return to campus. Further information, including application materials and deadlines, will be available at the beginning of September from Margaret Townsend, Dean for Academic Advising.

<u>ALUMNI OFFICE</u> The Alumni Office has a new face in the person of Alice E. Cornwell -Kenyon '75. Alice is Assistant Director of Alumni Affairs so make yourself known to her when you return to the campus.

The Alumni/ae Council of the Alumni/ae Association has as its new president Patrick A. McGraw '63, its second vice president William A. Cheney '49 and Council member Leon A. Peris '51, directing the Admissions effort. During the year the Council successfully launched the Career Counseling pilot program in New York City, soon to be expanded to other metropolitan areas. As an adjunct to the Career Development Extern Program, Career Counseling offers the graduate a chance to discuss with a Kenyon "veteran" the pros and cons of a certain profession or business opportunity preparatory to a commitment.

The Kokosingers, Owl Creek Singers, Breezy & Claire and the Kenyon Revue Players entertained a number of alumni during the annual regional association dinners. In total fourteen locations were visited, attracting over nine hundred alumni/ae. Several cities got wrapped up in revitalization, once again, giving the local groups a chance to organize and activate programs such as Admissions, Career Development, Phonathons and social gatherings.

Separate on-campus activities were planned over the year to provide a convenient time for returning alumni/ae to enjoy the classroom, campus, or sports, i.e. Departmental Advisory Program, Homecoming, Kenyon Today (nice to have been able to tie this in with Kenyon's 26th straight OAC Swimming Championship.) These groups, plus a very enthusiastic Commencement/Reunion crowd, kept Middle Path alive with a variety of class years from fall through spring.

The vitality of the Alumni Association is expanding. This summer, Dayton, following several years of silence, has a picnic planned on Friday, August 10th for prospective, entering and current students plus parents. Los Angeles is busy shaping an organization for its alumni/ae. It's understandable. Each graduating class increases the alumni/ae association by over 300 members, most of whom are eager to carry on Kenyon's traditions.

An imaginative collaboration of top theatrical professionals and undergraduate liberal arts students will continue this year at Kenyon College, supported by a major grant from the George Gund Foundation of Cleveland.

The grant enables the development of a Kenyon Repertory Theater that holds promise of becoming an important educational and entertainment center of the Midwest. Ted Walch has been named director of the Kenyon Repertory Theater. Walch, a 1963 Kenyon graduate, is on the faculty of St. Albans School in Washington, D. C. and is also director of a professional summer theater, Shakespeare and Company. Prospects for the new Kenyon Repertory Theater include a summer theater and dance (beginning in 1980) in which students and professionals will cooperate in all phases of production; the availability of visiting professionals collaborating with students during the academic year; and regular visits by professional dance troupes and repertory companies.

NU PHI KAPPA Work continues on the third floor of Ascension Hall to restore the former home of the Nu Phi Kappa literary society to its original charm and beauty. The physical restoration should be completed by early Fall with hopes that the room will be available as a study lounge shortly afterward.

NEW TRANSPORTATION<br/>POLICY REGARDING<br/>USE OF COLLEGE<br/>OWNED VEHICLESCollege owned vehicles will now be used only for College related business.<br/>This new policy includes usage by student organizations for transportation<br/>relating to their purpose and specifically excludes renting vehicles for<br/>personal use. A complete explanation about this change in policy will be<br/>available in the Fall.

ATHLETIC COMPLEX During the spring and summer months members of the College's administration and athletic department staffs have been deeply involved in a series of scheduled meetings with architects and engineers from Brubaker and Brandt, a Columbus, Ohio architectural firm. The major emphasis in these meetings has focused on the design of the ARC (Athletics-Recreation-Convocation) building, but also included are plans for renovating Wertheimer Fieldhouse, redesigning the outdoor playing fields and track; new tennis courts; and converting Shaffer Pool into a dance studio. The conceptual design for the ARC (to be built where the south tennis courts are now located) includes:

- (1) an arena area for basketball, volleyball and like athletic events which can easily be converted for convocations and concerts
- (2) an 118' x 45' swimming pool
- (3) six handball/racquetball and squash courts
- (4) an exercise room
- (5) a training room
- (6) appropriate offices, lockerrooms, showerrooms, and equipment storage spaces

The facilities in the new building are being designed to supplement the space and facilities in Wertheimer to offer comprehensive program opportunities for recreational, instructional, intramural and varsity use. The entire complex, when completed, should provide Kenyon with recreational and athletic facilities that will be among the very best when compared to any small college in the country.

Although no dates have yet been announced for either starting construction or a fund-raising campaign, members of the Development Office staff and numerous alumni have been busy with organizational planning. During the coming year students will have the opportunity to become involved with building and campaign planning. It will be an exciting venture.
