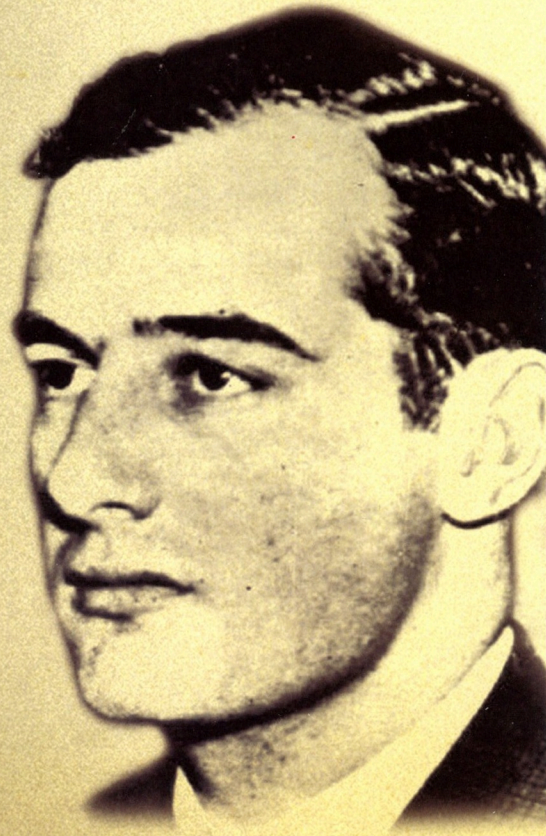

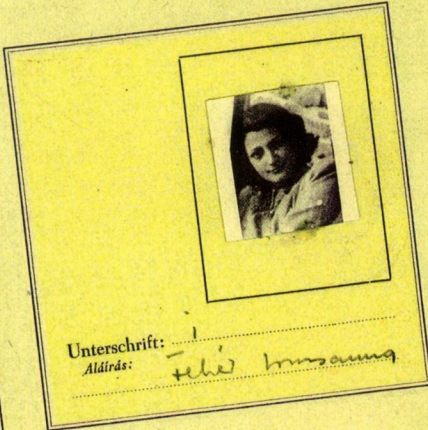


- Born in Sweden in 1912
- 1931: studied Architecture at the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor, USA, where he learned to speak English, German and French.
- 1935: received a Bachelor of Science degree.
- Worked in Cape Town, South Africa, for a Swedish construction materials company.
- 1935/36: employed by Holland Bank, Haifa, Israel.
- 1936: returned to Sweden to work for an export-import company trading between Stockholm and central Europe, owned by a Hungarian Jew, Kalman Lauer.
- 1941 on he travelled regularly as a trusted representative to Budapest, Hungary; within a year, he was a joint owner and International Director of the company.
- 9 July 1944: Wallenberg travelled to Budapest as the First Secretary to the Swedish legation in Budapest. A Christian diplomat, in a six-month period, he saved 100,000 Jewish lives from the Nazis. He issued 'special' Swedish protective passports (German: Schutzpass), established protective housing, soup kitchens, hospitals, orphanages and schools. He rescued Jews from sealed deportation trains and, ultimately, in one night, saved 70,000 Jews by having Eichmann's final orders to bomb a Jewish ghetto, countermanded.
- Arrested in January 1945 by Russian troops, his whereabouts have remained a mystery.
- 1981: named an Honorary Citizen of the USA.
- 1985: named First Honorary Citizen by Canada.
- 1986: named First Honorary Citizen by Israel.
- Five stamps have been issued in honour of Raoul Wallenberg: Israel was the first (1983), followed by Sweden (1987), Argentina (1996), the United States (1997), and Uruguay (2000).

Bis Abreise steht der Obengenannte und seine Wohnung unter dem Schutz der Kgl. Schwedischen Gesandtschaft in Budapest.

Gültigkeit: erlischt 14 Tage nach Einreise nach Schweden.

A budapesti Svéd Kir. Követség igazolja, hogy fentnevezett — a Svéd Kir. Külügyminisztérium által jóváhagyott — repatriálás keretében Svédországba utazik. Nevezett a kollektív útlevelelben is szerepel.

Elutazásáig fentnevezett és lakása a budapesti Svéd Kir. Követség oltalma alatt áll.

Érvényét veszti a Svédországba való megérkezéstől számított tizennegyedik napon.

SCHUTZ-PASS

Issued by Raoul Wallenberg during 1944-45 to Jews in Budapest, Hungary, a Schutz-Pass was a document which supposedly placed the recipient under the protection of neutral Sweden. During the final months of the Second World War, more than 30,000 such Swedish diplomatic papers were issued to Hungarian Jews preventing their deportation and murder by German Nazis and the Hungarian fascist Arrow Cross, who believed the Schutz-Pass to be genuine.

This Schutz-Pass was received by the late Susan Reichman (née Feher) in Budapest in 1944; later, she became a member of Raoul Wallenberg Unit of B'nai B'rith, Melbourne. It has been reproduced here with the kind permission of her family.
