In the News

- The U.S. Supreme Court will receive the constitutionality of Ohio's latest Parochial law that gives \$88.8 million in materials over the next two years to parochial schools. The American Civil Liberties Union charges that this law violates the First Amendment separation of church and state.
- Attorney General William J. Brown charged two Columbus podiatrists, their surgical service firm, and three area pharmacies with Medicaid fraud. Suit has been filed against Dr. Norman Carter and Dr. Barry Cohen for overcharging Ohio's Medicaid program \$60,000 in conjunction with three branches of Lynn Drugstores.
- A winter storm bringing high winds, snow, and ice to the East coast was also blamed for the sinking of an empty U.S. oil tanker off of Cape Ann, Massachusetts. One seaman is missing and six were rescued. This is the thirteenth accident involving a tanker in U.S. waters in the last month.

In the News

In Phoenix, Arizona a man accused of killing newsman Don Bolles pleaded guilty to a reduced charge of second-degree murder on Saturday. John Harvey Adamson admitted to the judge that he placed a bomb under Bolles' car in a hotel parking lot.

US Senators John Glenn and Harrison A. Williams Jr. are among those making yet another try at reuniting ailing Anatol Michelson with the wife and daughter he left behind when he fled Russia in 1956. The Soviet-forced separation is the longest recorded in State Department records.

Death penalty opponents turned to prayer and protest Saturday as convicted killer Gary Mark Gilmore awaited execution to be held at sunrise this morning by a five-man firing squad.

The US Parole Commission will conduct hearings in Washington January 25 and 27 on the parole application of Watergate burglar E. Howard Hunt. Hunt will plead his own case.

A white collar crime ring was smashed by a fake police fencing operation that recovered \$16.4 million in stolen merchandise in Norfolk, Virginia, a spokesman for the FBI reported.

In the News

Indiana has become the 35th state to ratify Equal Rights Amendment. Three more states are needed before the amendment will be added to the Constitution.
President Ford asked Congress to approve the defense agreement with Turkey that was arranged last March. The agreement will give Turkey \$1 billion.
Defense Secretary Rumsfeld said that the U.S. should increase defense spending in the next three years to maintain a superior position over the U.S.S.R..
President Ford presented the report of the Council of Economic Advisors to Congress yesterday. The report stated that although unemployment remained too high, it should go down to 7% by the end of 1977. Also, inflation decreased and the U.S. is more dependent on foreign oil than it previously has been.

A gas explosion at the University of Pittsburgh killed two people and injured 45. There is still a possibility of finding more bodies as search teams investigate the rubble.
There is now a calm in Egypt after two days of rioting that left 55 people dead and another 700 wounded. The riots over the rapid rise in food prices caused severe damage in the city The Coast Guard is still looking for survivors after the wreck of a freighter that sank Thursday after breaking in half.
Two teams of San Francisco police rescued a man held for 72 hours. In total four men were arrested for the abduction of this man with a \$400,000 ransom.
Terrorist fighting broke out in Mexico City yesterday killing two engineers and one American. Guerrillas began rioting after being prohibited from distributing pamphlets.
In New York a judge passed a ruling that men cannot be exempt from alimony payments.

It is predicted that it will take two to three years before coffee production reaches an adequate level. General Foods announced a new price hike to \$3.11 per pound.

In the News

Sen. Robert C. Byrd urged President Carter to appoint Byrd's predecessor as Senate Majority Leader, Mike Mansfield, to head the US mission to the People's Republic of China.
The US Parole Commission ordered Watergate conspirator E. Howard Hunt released from prison Feb. 25 if he pays a\$10,000 fine still pending against him. Hunt served 2½ years of a 30 month to eight year term in a Florida prison.
Thousands of mourners jammed Madrid for the funeral of three Communist lawyers slain by

rightists. Labor strikes spread across Spain as a protest against rightist violence. Premier Suarez cancelled a Middle East trip because of this violence which threatens an effort to sponsor the first elections in 41 years.

A controversial arms sale to Israel, proposed by Ford, received Carter's backing yesterday.

In the News

The final episode of "Roots" was viewed by more people in the United States than any other television show. Over 36 million people watched the program. House Rules Committee voted yesterday to reinstate the twelve man panel to investigate the assasinations of John Kennedy and Martin Luther King. The panel has until March 31st to justify its existence and is working under a very tight budget. The UN Secretary General believes that he can reconvene the Geneva Conference on the Middle East early this spring. He expects a Palestinian representative to attend. Another storm hit the Great Lakes Region yesterday bringing a fourth blizzard to Buffalo within ten days. Florida also suffered another frost. Due to the weather and gas problems 2.2 million people are out of work in 17 states. The House Rules Committee passed Carter's Emergency gas bill but there will be a delay in a completion of the bill as it now must be reconciled with the Senate's approved version. Gas is expected to be available to home owners but at higher prices.

His speech was the first comprehensive presentation of his blueprint for the conservative future.

In the News

The President chose Stansfield Turner, a former classmate at the Naval Academy, for the dual job of Director of Central Intelligence and Head of the CIA. Carter retained Jack Eckherd as head of the General Services Administration.

Rhodesian guerrillas killed seven white Catholic missionaries in a mission outside Salisbury. One priest was not massacred and reported the horror to the London sponsors of the mission. General Motors' fourth quarter earnings jumped 29% to \$797 million, while a full-year net more than doubled to a record \$2.9 million.

US Secretary-General Waldheim flew to Beirut to meet with Lebanese leaders about a possible Middle East Peace conference.

Two Soviet cosmonauts were launched into orbit and will try to link their Soyuz spaceship with a lab already in orbit. A similar attempt failed in October.

A US-Soviet dispute over grain shipping has been largely resolved.

In the News

- President Carter said he has indirect information that Premier Fidel Castro intends to withdraw the 15,000 or more soldiers he sent to Angola to help a Marxist faction win the civil war. A withdrawal would be a step toward establishing diplomatic relations with both countries, according to Carter.
- A pay increase for members of Congress and other high officials seem assured as a bid to force a House roll-call vote on the issue failed. The raise would lift legislator's income \$12,900 a year to \$57,500.
- Britain said it will deport Philip Agee, a former CIA agent who wrote an expose of the agency, and Mark Hosenball, an American journalist who has worked with Agee. The British government denied that it was acting at the request of the CIA. The administration hopes to curb rising hospital costs through federal limits on each hospital's year-to-year increase in revenue from all sources as a first step toward national health insurance.



Snowplow operators and other maintenance workers failed to show up at work yesterday at Boston's Logan International Airport during a snowstorm, thus forcing the closing of the nation's eighth busiest airport.
Sources say that the proposed tax rebates will probably be denied to those with incomes of over \$25,000.
A chemical tank ruptured in Southeastern Louisiana resulting in massive clouds of chlorine gas. Several hundreds of people were evacuated.

In Dallas, Texas tank cars containing propane gas exploded, touching off several fires, which are predicted to touch off other explosions. The cause of the original explosion is not known.

In the News

Secretary of State Cyrus R. Vance said Saturday that the 240 Americans in Uganda are safe and he does not believe the situation will develop into a crisis. Vance made the assessment following a meeting at the State Department with U.N. Secretary General Kurt Waldheim.
Hundreds of Langi tribesmen suspected of plotting against Uganda's Pres. Idi Amin were strangled and clubbed to death on the night of Feb. 18 at Kampala's military police head-quarters, according to a Ugandan refugee who said he was there.
The AFL-CIO called for an end to profit-making nursing homes last Saturday. They charged that older Americans living in nursing homes face widespread "patterns of abuse".
A full year after leftists abducted Ohio executive William Niehous, no word has been heard

of his fate. Niehous had managed Venezualan operations of Owens-Illinois Inc., the multinational container company from Toledo, Ohio.



In the News

The Penobscot and Passamaquoddy Indians will press a claim that 4 million acres in the interior of Maine were taken from them illegally in 1790. This claim is backed by the Justice Dept. but said it sould be settled in Congress, not the courts. The Indians have dropped their claim to 8.5 million acres of heavily populated land on the coast of Maine.

- President Idi Amin, of Uganda, has postponed meeting with 240 Americans in that country for the second time. Amin continues to state that he summoned the Americans to thank them for their work and honor some of them.
- Former Hitler deputy, Rudolf Hess, tried to kill himself last week in West Berlin's Spandau prison. At age 82, Hess is the only remaining prisioner at Spandau.
- Robert Mardian, the former Assistant Attorney General whose Watergate cover-up conviction was overturned, was reinstated as a member of the Supreme Court bar.

In the News

The UN Human Rights Commission after four days of meetings has decided not to investigate alleged violations in Uganda. Meanwhile, Uganda broadcasted by radio that 2,600 mercenary troops were advancing to invade the country via Kenya.

Rescue workers probing a flooded mine shaft near Harrisburg, Pa. found the body of another miner. It is feared that seven other missing miners are also buried in the mine. Negotiations over the control of the Panama Canal will resume next month.

The House assassination panel's chairman, Henry Gonzalez, resigned in a feud with its staff director. The committee may collapse with the House reluctant to extend funding. Europe's Communists began a summit meeting in Madrid as chiefs of the Italian, French and Spanish parties gathered in the first such meeting in 40 years. They immediately called for the legalization of the Spanish party.

Governor Rhodes has introduced a bill to crack down on cigarette boot-legging in Ohio. Rhodes says that the state looses 22 million dollars annually because of this problem.

In the News

Friday's earthquake in Romania caused 746 deaths and injured 5,600 others. Hitting 7.6 on the Richter Scale, buildings shook from Rome to Moscow.

Defense Secretary Harold Brown reported that there are too many inefficiencies in the military system. After clearing up these inefficiencies, if there are still problems then Brown said that the US would have to seriously look into resuming the draft. Henry Gonzalez, past chairman of the House Assassination Committee, said yesterday that "vast and powerful elements will prevent any meaningful investigation into the deaths of Martin Luther King and John Kennedy". Others feel that this Committee can make advances under new leadership. The House will consider these two viewpoints today. In Tower City, Pennsylvania, the bodies of two more miners have been discovered. One man, buried for five days, was pulled to safety and is in critical condition. Rescue officials

are not giving up hope for the five other missing miners.

Doctor Bernard is researching the possibility of transplanting the heart of a baboon into a human. This would be a temporary measure until an adequate human heart could be found.

In the News

U.S. Secretary of State Cyrus R. Vance arrived in Moscow Saturday night for talks with the Soviets on nuclear arms control and said his visit "makes clear that detente remains in our mutual interests."

The five-month-old Thai government fended off a coup attempt by a far-right former general Saturday and announced that the ringleaders were being deported. One general and his aide were killed in the short-lived rebellion.

Ugandan President Idi Amin accused the U.S. CIA on Saturday of using Christian denominations as a cover for subversion and said he would bar all foreign aid to churches in his country.

The Iranian government reported that the death toll from the strong earthquake that rocked Iran's Persian Gulf coast four days ago had risen to 167, and that as of Saturday aftershocks were still being felt in the area of Tuesday's main quake.

In the News

The Supreme Court broadened state power to tax companies engaged in interstate transportation. The Port Authority of New York and New Jersey postponed its scheduled vote Thursday on whether to let the British-French Concorde supersonic airliner fly into Kennedy airport. Carter told Rabin that the US wants Israel to have "defensible borders". Press Secretary Powell said that the policy is "not to become involved in attempting to dictate the specifics" of an Israeli-Arab settlement. Sadat opened and Arab-African summit meeting in Cairo with a call for solidarity against Israel, Rhodesia and South Africa. Ireland put eight British soldiers on trial on charges of possessing weapons with intent to endanger life. The soldiers are members of a British undercover unit. The US flew several tons of medicine to Rumania in an Air Force cargo plane and earthquake relief supplies began arriving from other Western countries.

The Army reported yesterday that it has conducted 19 germ warfare attacks on civilian targets over a period of twenty years.

By the end of this month, American citizens will be able to travel to Cuba, Cambodia and Vietnam. Although Americans have been traveling to these countries without harm the necessary legislation to secure passage is now in the workings.

- Soviet Communist Party leader Leonid Brezhnev told Secretary of State Cyrus Vance that US-Soviet relations can't improve if the US meddles in Russian internal affairs. American officials assume that Pres. Carter's statements on rights of dissidents won't be an obstacle to progress in arms control.
- Richard Nixon's attempt to bar public distribution of 30 White House tapes reached the Supreme Court. It agreed to decide whether the tapes played at the Watergate cover-up trial are part of the public record and thus may be reproduced and sold. Nixon says distribution would violate his privacy.
- The Defense Dept. authorized the armed services to upgrade as many as 432,000"undesirable" and "general" discharges given during the Vietnam era. Although those involved will have to apply to service review boards, persons in some categories will be reclassified automatically.

In the News

The Soviet Union turned down two American plans to limit strategic weapons without offering any new proposals of its own. Eight working groups were set up to deal with other US-Soviet issues. Carter remained hopeful that the two sides could reach an agreement. More than 50 survivors of the plane collision in the Canary Islands were flown to the US for

treatment, 12 of the most seriously hurt going to an Army burn center at San Antonio. Former Senate Majority Leader Mike Mansfield is Carter's choice for ambassador to Japan. Murders and muggings declined 10% last year, and the overall rate of serious crime reported

to police didn't increase for the first time in five years. Only larceny was up, reflecting more thefts of CB radios.

Four sugar companies were indicted on federal charges of conspiring to fix prices of industrial cane sugar. The period investigated was from August 1972 until September 1973. ***** ***** *********

The freighters will bring the remains for identification at the base morgue, which was used extensively during the Vietnam War.

Egyptian President Anwar Sadat is expected to ask for US arms and for a detailed explanation of the administration's Middle East peace plans in his talks this week with Carter. Tornadoes touched down in at least four Midwestern states on Saturday causing heavy property damage and injuries to at least a dozen persons. Hardest hit was Kalamazoo Co., Mich.

In the News

A Southern Airways DC9 was reportedly carrying 81 passengers as it crashed and burned 35 miles northwest of Atlanta. The plane hit stores and moving vehicles in its descent.

Castro was greeted by Soviet President Podgorny in Moscow yesterday to discuss their visits to Africa earlier this week. Both men called for a quick end to white-minority government in Rhodesia and South Africa, in contrast to British and American efforts to arrange a more gradual transition to majority rule.

Former Secretary of State Kissinger told a Senate subcommittee that unless the US stops squandering energy, the nation's foreign policy will be influenced by countries that supply our energy. The Pentagon recalled Ret. General Andrew Goodpasture to take command of the troubled West Point Military Academy and reassigned its current commander, Lt. Gen. Sidney Berry. The Defense Dept. said no active duty officer was qualified and available for the post.

stay longer. In Pakistan police opened fire last Saturday on hundreds of antigovernment demonstrators trying to block swearing-in ceremonies for a provincial assembly in Lahore. Sixteen were killed.
Three men sought in last week's killing of West Germany's chief prosecutor, Siegfried Buback, have been seen in Sweden and a national alert has been posted.

In the News

The United States and Cuba signed two more documents furthering "normal" relations. Two major oil companies have been accused by the government of buying oil from their overseas counterparts at high rates and passing the costs onto the consumer. The overcharge, of 336 million dollars, will be rolled back and the government is calling for refunds to be paid to the customers.

In a recent poll, only 56% of the American public were in favor of ERA. This percentage is nine points lower than what it was at election time in the fall.

Consumer Protection Agencies have launched a new campaign -this time against asbestos. The material is used presently as a fireguard, and has been proven to be a cause of cancer. In New York, a judge is questioning the city's refusal to allow the supersonic jets to land.

The judge feels that a trial should be run before any decisions should be finalized. Twenty-four invalids have staged a protest in San Francisco but yesterday their pleas were

heard and legislation was passed by HEW calling for equal rights for invalids.

The United States and Vietnam opened talks yesterday in Paris in hopes of establishing formal diplomatic relations.

In the Pentagon, Harold Brown has ordered that the lines of production of the intercontinental **ballistic** missiles be kept in operation for a least the next two months. The missiles are being produced to insure the availability of spare parts and not to increase our weapon supply, according to Brown.

In the News

Striking Cincinnati teachers came back to the bargaining tables today after six days. The walk-out, seventeen days ago, involves more than three thousand teachers in the city. President Carter flew to London for a summit meeting with Allied leaders yesterday. There has been a recall of over 300,000 Mr. Coffeemakers because of improper wiring systems. At the National Conference of Roman Catholic Bishops, the bishops decided to re-investigate the Vatican findings on women serving as priests in the Church.

The Judicial branch of the government body approved the "Instant Registration" plan of Carter, which would allow non-registered voters to vote on the day of the election. The proposal now has to go before the full house for a final decision to be made.

Carter praised Nixon for "admitting he lied to the American people" but doubted that the confession enlightened the citizens of this country.

In the News

At a meeting in Geneva President Carter and Syria's President Hafez Assad outlined a peace plan agreed to by most Arab leaders. The two men discussed ways to ensure security in the Mideast, including demilitarized zones. Carter plans to send Secretary of State Cyrus Vance to the Mideast to continue the talks and finalize the plans. UN Ambassador Andrew Young left for a 12-day tour of Africa, although South Africa hasn't said yet whether it will let him in. The ambassador will attend a meeting in Mozambique. A late season snowstorm knocked down trees and power lines in New York and parts of New England. Snow reached depths of twelve inches in some places and fell briefly in New York City. A stamp collection valued at \$100,000 or more was stolen from New York's public library. Patricia Hearst was sentenced to five years' probation for shooting up in Los Angeles store. The House Assassination Committee investigators went to Memphis for a week's study of the killing nine years ago of Martin Luther King Jr. Earl Ray is serving a 99 year sentence now.

UPPERCLASSMEN REGISTER ON SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 4 Student residences will be open for returning students on Saturday, September 3, at 9:00 a.m. The first meal will be served that evening between 5:00 and 6:30. Registration for returning students will take place on Sunday, September 4. Classes begin Monday, September 5 (Labor Day). UPPERCLASSMEN MAY NOT RETURN BEFORE SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 3, UNLESS YOU HAVE BEEN ASSIGNED TO HELP WITH THE FRESHMAN ORIENTATION PROGRAM.

OPENING CONVOCATION

The formal Opening of the College will be held at 7:30 p.m., Sunday, September 4, on Samuel Mather Lawn. President Philip H. Jordan will officiate. All upperclassmen are especially invited to attend.

CHANGE OF REGULATIONSA new policy concerning COURSE CHANGES will be followedFROM THE REGISTRAR'S OFFICEin the Registrar's Office beginning in September. A studentwill still have two weeks at the beginning of each semester

to make changes in his enrollment via a Course Change Card, having obtained the signature of his/her advisor. The difference is that <u>after two weeks</u>, any changes will be subject to a special handling fee. This fee will be assessed for each Course Change Card submitted after the first two weeks of classes, and is determined by a scale that increases with each week. In addition, there will be a charge of \$1 for each course listed on the Course Change Card. These fees are assessed both to encourage students to make changes during the first two weeks, and to help defray expenses incurred which result from the necessity of making special changes. Details will be available at registration time and in the 1977-78 Student Handbook.

The Faculty also approved a new policy regarding INCOMPLETES. Beginning this fall, it will be the responsibility of the <u>student</u> to request an Incomplete of the Deans, who may approve only in case the student experienced a serious illness or personal or family problem which prevented completion of a course. Thus, the previous practice of asking an instructor for an Incomplete because of the press of other assignments will no longer be approved.

HOUSING ASSIGNMENT of those facilities. This year it will be unnecessary for parents of students 18 years of

a Family Practitioner, and Dr. Daniel Michel, a specialist in Pediatrics

and Adolescent Medicine, will both serve as College Physicians. These Mount Vernon physicians will meet with students by appointment at the Health Service clinic, and will also be on call for emergencies and special consultations. Dr. James J. Wanken, Orthopedic Surgeon, will serve as physician to the varsity football team and will also be available for other athletic team injuries. A Health Service brochure describing all services offered by the Student Health Service will be available in September. IN MEMORIAM The Kenyon community was sorrowed by the recent deaths of two of its members.

Joseph S. (Jeff) O'Daniel '79 died on June 26 from injuries received in an automobile accident on June 22. While traveling to his home in Westerville, Ohio, after visiting with a nearby friend, his auto was hit at a main intersection by another auto that ran a red light at a high rate of speed. Jeff was an outstanding scholar, a member of Delta Phi Fraternity, a member of the varsity swimming team and Ohio Conference backstroke champion, and was loved and admired by all who knew him.

James F. Cass, Chief Security Officer at Kenyon since 1962, died on June 29 after a prolonged illness. During his years at Kenyon, Jim Cass worked diligently to improve security and safety procedures on the campus. He was regarded as a friend and benefactor by thousands of Kenyon students, and his dignity and fairness were always respected.

ADMISSIONS OFFICE A bumper crop of freshmen will be joining the Gambier and Kenyon com-MOTES munity on September 1. At the present time there are approximately 185 women and 250 men from 35 states and nine foreign countries in the entering class. In addition, about 20 transfer students have been accepted.

The Admissions staff wishes to express its thanks to all of you who gave so much time and effort last year in assisting our office. The tour guides, the Chase and Hannah More Societies and the Freshman Council were especially helpful throughout the year.

A special thanks also goes to each and every freshman who so willingly agreed to keep a visiting student overnight. During 1976-77 there were more of these visits than ever before, and the great hospitality shown these overnight visitors was a major factor in the success of this year's recruiting efforts.

Visitors, both parents and students, always mention the warmth and openness they feel at Kenyon compared to other campuses they visit. We are frequently told that Kenyon students all seem happy and are smiling and friendly. The atmosphere generated this way makes the admission work much easier and helps the College maintain its standards. Your help and cooperation are truly appreciated.

Assistant Director appointments - Evan Eisner has joined the staff as an Assistant Director of Admissions, replacing Gay Garth who returned to Washington in January. As you know, Evan received his Kenyon A.B. cum laude in May.

Bettye York has been hired as Assistant Director of Admissions, part-time, to take the place of Donna Scott who will devote full attention to the job of Equal Opportunity Coordinator. Mrs. York will handle ilumni admissions work. Some of you will remember her from the Student Activities Office.

STUDENT ENROLL-
MENT, 1977-78Exact figures are yet to be determined, but it appears that the College
will open on September 4 with an enrollment larger than the 1387 students
who registered in September 1976. Several factors are responsible for
the increase: this year's freshman class of 430 plus is slightly larger than last year's
class; fewer students withdrew from the College during the 1976-77 year and during this
summer; more students are returning from Off-Campus Study than are going; and nearly 40
students who formerly withdrew have applied to return. Kenyon's largest opening enroll-
ment, about 1450 in both 1974 and 1975, may be exceeded this year.

In addition to providing for and scheduling all services in the Church of the Holy Spirit, he will be associated with all campus religious programs and activities. The Reverend and Mrs. Stelk and their two children will reside in the Rectory on Kokosing Drive. Fortunately for Kenyon and Gambier, <u>The Rev. Richard L. Harbour</u>, who this year retired as Rector and Chaplain, will remain with us and has already occupied his new home that has a commanding view on the outskirts of the Village.

<u>Ms. Corlin Henderson</u> will begin her duties as <u>Assistant Dean of Students</u> on August 1. Ms. Henderson, a graduate of Colgate University, comes to Kenyon from the University of Vermont where she received an M.A. degree in Student Personnel in Higher Education this spring. DEVELOPMENT OFFICE NOTES The Development Office, which is responsible for the College's fund-raising programs, reports that for the first time in Kenyon's history we have gone over the \$2 million mark in total gifts from all sources in a single year.

Fifty-two per cent of all alumni (one of the highest percentages among colleges in the nation) have contributed through the Kenyon Fund and the \$209,000 goal was exceeded. The Parents' Fund has achieved a record high of over \$75,000 with gifts from more than 660 parents. A full report will be included in the September Alumni Bulletin.

ALUMNI OFFICE NOTES The weekend of May 27-29 was Kenyon's first combined Commencement-Alumni Reunion in ten years. Close to 2,000 people were on campus, including over 500 alumni, for the event-filled occasions. All participants agreed that the two events held on the same weekend was successful, indeed.

During 1976-77 the Kenyon Alumni Association had one of its busiest and most gratifying years ever. Under the leadership of William C. Williams '54, the Association sponsored, in addition to the Alumni Fund (see Development Notes above), numerous programs such as Alumni Day, the Extern Program, the Professional Alumni Visitation Program, Resume and Interview Workshops, and, of course, the Reunion Weekend in May.

The Extern Program, jointly sponsored by the Alumni Association and the After Kenyon Library, provides an opportunity for juniors to "try out" a career they are considering by spending a week at spring break on the job with an alumnus who is in that particular field.

NOTESThe Seitz House, at the corner of Wiggin and Park Streets, which is being
renovated to house the History Department, will be completed on August 1.NOTESTo combat the energy crises, the College is installing a 20,000 gallon reserve

oil tank and retubing four boilers for more efficient operation. An Energy Task Force has been organized, which consists of Engineers and College personnel, to provide an energy saving program not only for the present, but also for future planning.

Construction on the new Hill Theater began on July 5.

DECISION ON SLEEPING PLATFORMS On June 24 a special meeting was held to consider the advisability of permitting the use of constructed wooden sleeping platforms in student residences. The twelve persons attending included members of the administrative staff, Kenyon students, insurance company representatives, and state and local fire

officials. All aspects of the topic were discussed and alternatives were explored. It was clear to all, by the end of the discussion, that the only prudent and safe course of action for the College to follow is to prohibit the existence of sleeping platforms composed of combustible materials. While this decision may not be a popular one for some students, the College made it solely upon the consideration of safety for students in their residences.

PSYCHOLOGY DEPARTMENT NOTES

During the coming year, Professor Allan Fenigstein of the Psychology Department will be on a leave of absence at the University of Virginia to do research in social psychology. For the year that he is gone, Ms. Sally Lu Wilson will be teaching Professor Fenigstein's sections of Psychology 11-12 and his course

in Abnormal Psychology (Psychology 37). Ms. Wilson is currently finishing her dissertation research at Purdue University. She will also be teaching a course second semester in one of her interest areas, which include moral development, sex roles and androgyny, and religious development. Professor Fenigstein's other courses will not be offered until he returns in 1978-79.

POLITICAL SCIENCE The Department of Political Science has not yet hired an American public policy specialist, and has extended the search into 1977-78. This DEPARTMENT NOTES has required cancellation for next year of PSci 50, "Problems of American Democracy," and PSci 92, "Urban Politics." (PSci 11-12 or PSci 27 might be substituted for the first, and Anth 91(2) or Econ 73 for the second.)

Mr. Horwitz, who was asked by President Jordan to revitalize the Public Affairs Conference Center, has already undertaken, along with the Development Office, a fund-raising campaign for the purpose, and hopes to sponsor the first conference under the new program in 1978-79.

The latestvolume in the Kenyon Public Affairs Series, published by the University Press of Virginia, will be released in August. Based on the Bicentennial Conference of the KPAF in 1975 and 1976, the volume was edited by Mr. Horwitz and is entitled The Moral Foundations of the American Republic.

Six members of the Department Faculty will attend the annual meetings of the American Political Science Association in Washington, D.C. early in September, and three of them -Messrs. Agresto, Clor and Scorza - are on the program. Mr. Melanson has taken over the Kenyon pre-law advising job from Mr. Trethewey. Mr. Frame succeeds Mr. Clor as Chair of the Department on July 1.
