Letter from Lady Carnegie

Lady Carnegie

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Lady Carnegie begs to assure
Bishop Chase that it would
have been very gratifying to her
to have enjoyed the privilege of
meeting with him - had it been
the will of Providence that he should
visit this distant part of the Island.
She is much obliged to him for
conveying her friend Mr. Clibborns
letter, and for sending along with
it the interesting account of his
extensive Diocese. Though she
herself belongs to her own National
Church - which is Presbyterian - she
is equally anxious for the spread
of the true faith by the Episcopal
Church; and much alive to the
danger there is of an increase of
Popish superstition wherever the

true light does not prevail. a
great effort is now making by the
established Church in Scotland -
and all who belong to it - in order
to meet the wants of an increased
population; which, in addition to
other urgent claims, puts it out
of her power to press the interesting
claims of the Miner's upon others -
or to meet them herself as she
could have wished. but she begs
that Bishop Chase will accept of
a small donation of five pounds
(for books or any other purpose)
together with her good wishes and
prayers for every blessing on himself
and on the interesting work to which
he has been so long & so zealously devoted.
