Dear Sister

I do most sincerely sympathize with you in your distressful illness of the Tuberculosis

I know how hard it for I suffered enough from it when in my

May God strengthen you to bear his will for Christ's sake.

At first I understood (by mistake) that it was our dear Brother Dudley who was the sufferer; from him I hear good news since, concerning health. May this blessing soon return to you dear beloved Sister.

My dear son Dudley was ordained on the 5th of June 1842

He proves a most acceptable
Preacher. He and his wife live right
opposite to us distant 20 rods -

You see by this we have moved
from the Robinsons place to the
Tubster Cottage.

Mary is now Mistress of the
School rooms 7 in number.

Quite disguised and I hope
well qualified to do good.

It is now vacation with us -

My own health is better than
it has been. Mr Chase my
dear wife is well & sends her
love

Samuel is in fine health
but Sarah his wife is not so well

at present Lucia is absorbed in taking
care of her green Children.

Fide. Math. and Robby Wright the
most interesting objects I ever knew
and they hope please us all -
she is our organist and will
teach the female pupils lessons
on the piano. Henry & his wife are
well.

Philander is a great strong
boy he enters college this
evening of the coming term.
I hope will make a good min-
ister.

I know, I wish
God will provide.

In great haste I write & hope
this letter and with love to
