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TEAM PREPARES FOR OTTERBEIN ELEVEN

Otterbein Formidable Foe After Trouncing Hiram By Score of 24-7

INVADERS HEAVIER

Oberlin and Mt. Union Teams, Remaining Opponents, Strong Saturday

Coach "Scrappy" Lambert is in the process of preparing his Purple eleven to meet an up and coming team from Otterbein this Saturday afternoon at Westerville. This will be Kenyon's third clash of the season in the Ohio Conference, and will put the team either above or below the 500 mark in the standings.

At the start of the season it looked like this Otterbein game might be one which Kenyon would win by a good score. Otterbein lost its first three games, and had not won until last Saturday when it tripped Hiram by the score of 24 to 7. It was Hiram's fourth defeat of the season.

It was only a week or so ago that Kenyon barely managed to take Hiram over in Benson Bowl. So, if comparison of scores means anything, Kenyon must be prepared for a good battle with the Westervillites.

The Otterbein team is built mostly around the fullback. He does the punting, running, and most everything else that a good back is supposed to do. He is an exceptionally good punter, his kicks averaging close to fifty yards a try.

SPEED BALL BEGINS

November 4 Is Opening Date Of Next Sport

The intra-mural speedball schedule opens next Monday with four Games will be played on Mondays, mural field behind the station. CHANGES MADE IN INTRAMURAL AWARDS

Division Must Be Twice Winner In Sport To Retain Possession Of Cup

The Intra-Mural Board has approved a new system of awards necessitated by the present extensive intra-mural program. With some twenty sports on the calendar the expenditure for individual cups each year would be prohibitively high. The Board has decided that cups shall be awarded the winners of each sport, but that the cups shall not become the permanent possession of any division until that division has won the sport twice, not necessarily consecutively.

In addition to the temporary cup the winner of a sport shall be given a medallion to be kept permanently. The medallions will be cast the same for all sports, but will have a space on them for the name of the sport, the winner, and the year.

In the gymnasium the Board plans to place plaques that will be the property of the Athletic Association, one for each sport, to be inscribed with the name of the winner every year. Thus, there will be a permanent public record of intra-mural champions in each sport, in addition to the medallions and the two-year cups.

KENYON TEAM JOINS POLO ASSOCIATION

Aid of R. A. Weaver, '12 Will Enable Team to Enter National Matches

TO PLAY OHIO STATE

Through the generous gift of Robert A. Weaver, '12, the polo team has been able to join the Intercollegiate Division of the United States National Indoor Polo association. The Kenyon team is now eligible to play any registered team in the country on a nationwide handicap basis.

Because the polo team has joined the association, it will be eligible to go to New York next spring to compete in the national championship matches. Between now and then, however, the team must defeat Ohio State's riders, but if a game cannot be arranged with State, the Kenyon group will still be in a position to go East. Plans are being drawn up for a game with Ohio State in Cleveland in December, but no definite date has yet been set.

CROSS-COUNTRY MEET TO BE HELD NOV. 15

Three-Man Teams Will Plod County Hills in Intra-Mural Marathon

The intra-mural cross-country meet, to be run by at three-man team from each division over a hilly three and one-half mile course, has been scheduled for the afternoon of Nov. 15.

There will be a three-man team from each division, and no man shall be eligible who has not covered the course at least twelve times for training. The training period opens tomorrow, which leaves a week and a half for the runners to get into condition. Men who plan to become eligible to run for their divisions should report to Wilson or Kenyon before going out to run the course.

The course selected will start at Rosse Hall, pass around the top of the Hill to the Hotel Hill, down the Hill, over the Wagon bridge, straight out that road to the "T" a mile and a half from the bridge, turn left and continue in an easterly direction, coming out on the Mill road south of the bridge over the Kokosing, follow back past the Bayou, and end again at Rosse Hall. The course is entirely on dirt roads with plenty of hills. Men will be counted as they come in, the first man getting one, those following getting points equal to their position in the field, until the last man gets thirty points. The low total of points will win the meet.

GENEVANS TRAMPLE PURPLE ELEVEN, 38-6

Four Hobart Touchdowns in Last Quarter Complete Kenyon Rout

FOUR VETS INJURED

Jasper Catches Pass From Sammon to Score Lone Kenyon Tally

A highly-underrated Hobart eleven, playing with entirely unexpected audacity and precision, blasted their way, Saturday, to a tumultuous 38-6 victory over the Purple, and severely crippled the latter in so doing.

Kenyon, on the other hand, fought gallantly to keep in the running, and only failed after seeing man after man carried to the sidelines, and linemen ending the game in backfield posts. It was depressing for followers of the Mauve, who were naturally disappointed, but this was chiefly because they believed Hobart to be far worse than they are.

The Geneva outfit was big and fast, powerful and deceptive, and as soon as they found out they were in for a winning day, they bore down harder than ever and finished with four touchdowns in the final quarter. They tackled fiercely but fairly, and every department clicked, proving that the days of football inferiority are a thing of the past for Hobart.

It is difficult to say what the final outcome of the game would have been if Kenyon men had not been injured, but since the injuries were due to onslaughts by Hobart, the final result is probably accurate. But it is too bad that Kenyon's full strength was not available for the entire fray. Harry McGinness received a shin bruise on the third play of the game and had to retire for the day. Then Walt Kirijan had his hand stepped on and had to be relieved. The next tough break occurred when Light-Horse Harry Brown had his head bumped, and Hank Sebach's brought the injury list to four by having his knee cave-in. Kenyon showing was not at all bad. The injuries made it necessary for "Peanuts" Boren to see service, and the midget came through with a great performance. Later, it was necessary to use Fritz Taylor and Dave Jasper in the backfield, and this shift brought Bob Paskins into the game at end.

The first quarter produced no score, but Hobart had the ball on the four yard line as the quarter ended. Three line bucks in the second quarter provided the score, and soon afterwards a long pass produced another tally for the lads from Geneva.

Kenyon then made its only flurry, coming back strong to score a touchdown, well-executed on a twenty-eight yard heave from Sammon to Jasper, who caught the ball on the two-yard line and stepped over the goal to bring the score to 13-6. Sammon missed the try for the extra point.

The third quarter was uneventful, but in the final canto, the Hobart boys stepped on the gas and left Kenyon in a cloud of Geneva dust. Four touchdowns they tallied, three on line plays and one on an end run. This brought the score to 38-6 when the game ended, and the Mauve went to the dressing-room for a well-earned rest.

The individual star of the game was Hobart's 195-pound King, who was personally responsible for four of the touchdowns. He was not a triple-threat man but a line plunger exclusively, but this threat was more than a threat, it was a promise.

Nineteen Kenyon men saw action and got a real baptism of fire. But we understand that Hobart plays Army next year, so we are sniffling through our hurts.

time of his death he was a member of the village council, and he had held many other village offices.

For thirty years he carried the mail from the railroad station to the postoffice, also operating a bus and baggage truck. In this capacity he was known to every Kenyon student, though many of them knew him only as "Mark Hanna."

The origin of this nickname seems to have been the occasion in 1902 when he conveyed the college guest of honor, the late Senator Marcus A. Hanna, to the Hill for the dedication of Hanna Hall.

Mr. Colwill was at one time a student at Kenyon Military Academy. His brother, Clarence B. Colwill, superintendent of the Knox County Infirmary, is a graduate of Kenyon College.







Oberlin gave a good account of itself in holding Case to a 12 to 6 victory. Case had previously held a good Carnegie Tech team to a 6 to 3 score.

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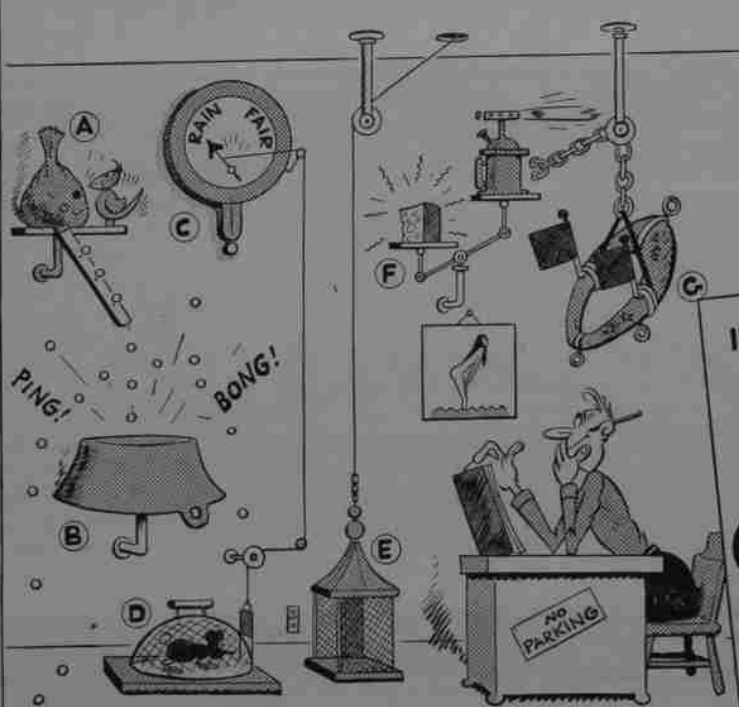
