GAMBIER BLACKOUT ON NOV. 30

Kenyon College and the town of Gambier will experience their first black-out on Monday, Nov. 30, at 8:00 P.M. The black-out, probably lasting about fifteen minutes, may be carried out in one of two ways. The authorities favor throwing the main switch in Rosse Hall, while the air raid wardens oppose it because they want the students to take the responsibility of turning out their own individual lights. Neither of these methods has yet been definitely chosen. The warning signal for the black-out will be three long blasts of a siren, and the all-clear will be one long blast.

Dr. Ashford will direct the blackout for the college. He will be assisted by the following air-raid wardens in each division: North Leonard, George Hills; Middle Leonard, Chester Cable; South Leonard, Groff College; East Wing,
