The Administration will limit the number of women admitted to 40 per cent of the total student body which will mean about 200 girls at the completion of the program. Only ex-service women will be accepted since one of the more impelling reasons for this radical departure from tradition is the providing of adequate educational facilities for veterans - of both sexes. In naming his find, Dr. Carroll fell back upon the time honored anthropological custom of naming the specimen for the region in which it is found. Since the teeth were found on one of the largest truck-farms in the world, a farm owned by one of the country's largest pea growers, Julius Q. (King of the Pea-Growers") Bates, Dr. Carroll named his creature in honor of Mr. Bates: "The Pea-King Man."

Dr. Carroll is now in his laboratories at Kenyon College composing a paper describing his discoveries to be read within the month before the A. S. S. (the Anthropological Science Society.)
