## UNDEFEATED!



## OBERLIN BARS PATH TO PERFECT SEASON

Fresh from Wednesday's victory over Kent State, the undefeated Kenyon swimming team is favored to sink Oberlin tomorrow in the Lord's last dual meet of the season. A win tomorrow would give Kenyon its first undefeated season since 1948. After Oberlin, the Lords will wind up their season by entering the Ohio Conference meet at Ohio Wesleyan on March 6.

At Oberlin tomorrow, Kenyon will be seeking revenge for last year's beating at the hands of the Yoemen. Oberlin's record this year shows that the Lords ought not to have too much trouble. Coach Bob Bartels may give his stars a good workout in preparation for the Conference meet the following week.

Kenyon is expected to be a top-heavy favorite to regain the Conference crown it lost two years ago. The mermen have lowered the varsity records for seven of the ten standard meet events thus far. The "Big Five," Captain Al Eastman, Ted FitzSimons, Skip Kurrus, Stan Krok, and Phil Payton, are currently the hottest swimmers in the Conference.

FitzSimons has lowered the times in the 50, 100 and 220 yd. free style events to :24.2, :53.0 and 2:15. Eastman, defending Ohio Conference champ in the 220 and 440 yd. free style, has lowered his 440 time to 5:03.8. Krok has been chopping away at the 200 yd. backstroke record all season and has it down to 2:23.2 at last report. Payton set a new individual medley record with a time of 1:44.4. The seventh record was chalked up by the 400 yd. free style relay team, composed of Eastman, Kurrus, Fitzsimons, and Charlie Ewing, who swam it in 3:45.

The Lords seem to have the free style events pretty well sewed up. In addition to the four record-breakers, Coach Bartels has four other fine free stylers on hand who should bring in some valuable points. Al Halverstadt, Charlie Ewing, "Buckets" Smith, and Paul Belin have shown up well

They have played in almost every famous night spot, hotel, and theatre in the U. S. A. and have appeared several times in the movies and on TV.

Pastor made his mark as a saxophonist with Artie Shaw's band. Here he sang the vocal for "Indian Love Call," a hit record which started him on his way. Afterward he organized his own band, and began cutting records for R. C. A. Victor, and Columbia. His unusual style and singing voice have given him a mark of recognition and guaranteed the success of many of his hit records, including "One Meat Ball," "Dinah," "Margie," "Gonna Get A Girl," and "You Started Something."

In conjunction with the announcement of Pastor being named, the Dean's office also issued a list of this semester's all-school dances. Only three dances are definitely scheduled: the Sophomore Dance tomorrow, the Military Ball on March 20 and Spring Dance-Weekend May 7 and 8. There is a possibility of a Junior Class Dance on April 10 or April 24, but at the moment it is just a possibility.

The Speech Department announces that Tau Kappa Alpha, the national honorary speech fraternity here at Kenyon, will sponsor the annual inter-fraternity oratory contest on March 21 and 23. In a preliminary contest on Sunday afternoon, two entrants from each division will be heard. Those qualifying will compete before the Tuesday morning assembly.

### Debaters Schedule Tourneys; Seek Men

After a belated start, the Kenyon debate team has launched its season with prospects bright for a successful year. Bob Greenberger, who heads the debaters this year, reports that the team has already been to one tournament. At Kent State last week, led by the negative team composed of Stan Walsh and Bob Stewart who won all three, Kenyon won four out of the six debates.

This Saturday, the team will take part in a split-team tournament at Case Tech in Cleveland. Unlike ordinary debate tournaments, competition is on an individual basis, with the two-man teams being composed of debaters from two different schools with debaters switching partners for each of the three debates.

Also on the team agenda is the Northwestern Ohio tournament at Case on March 13, with the best of the Ohio college debaters competing. Looking to the future, on April 8, the debate team from Harvard will meet Kenyon debaters in Rosse Hall at an assembly. The subject for this debate has not

been decided upon.

At present the team has but four active debaters. Besides the negative team of Walsh and Stewart, Greenberger and Steve Best compose the affirmative team. New members, especially freshmen who are interested in this "sport of argumentation", are encouraged to join the team. No previous experience in debate is essential. All that is required is an interest and a certain speaking ability which can usually be "picked up" by practice.

The topic being debated this year is: "Resolved That The U. S. Should Adopt A Policy of Free Trade."

### Draft Test Scheduled

All eligible students who intend to take the Selective Service College Qualification Test in 1954 should file applications at once for the April 22 administration, advises the Selective Service National Headquarters.

An application and a bulletin of information may be obtained at any Selective Service local board. Following instructions in the bulletin, the student should fill out his application immediately and mail it in the special envelope provided. Applications must be postmarked no later than midnight, March 8, 1954. Early filing of these forms is also advised.

Results will be reported to the student's Selective Service local board of jurisdiction for use in considering his deferment as a student, according to Educational Testing Service, which prepares and administers the College Qualification Test.

### SINGERS GIVE CONCERT SUN.

On this Sunday, February 28, 1954, at 5:00 P. M. the Kenyon singers will perform at St. Paul's Episcopal Church, in Marion, Ohio. Among the works to be performed are those of Schuetz Purcell, Handel, Wagner, Brahms, Gounod and Grieg. To conclude their concert they will sing a series of traditional Chanteys.

In early May, they will be hosts to the Western College Choir, singing a joint concert with this group on the Kenyon campus. And for May 11, they have received an invitation to be the featured chorus at the annual Male Chorus Festival in Cincinnati.

## In Our Opinion

Rushing is over. We hope the divisions have been able to clean up the spilled beer and soggy potato chips. We also hope that we never again, or at least not for a long time, hear those social clichés: "I don't believe I've met you . . . my name is . . . where are you from . . . what is your major . . . can I get you something . . ." We sympathize with the weary freshman who finally wrote out all the answers on his name card. We are glad to discard the false smile and the gushing friendliness and get back to our normal selves.

But while rushing is over, its problems are still with us. Has the new second semester rushing system been worthwhile? While our answers cannot be conclusive, we do feel that this first year calls for a few critical observations.

We think that the concept of second semester rushing is not in itself bad. Certainly we know many more freshmen better, and on the whole the freshmen know the campus groups better. Choices both ways have been made with less haste and greater deliberation.

These benefits, however, have been completely overshadowed by the problems created by second semester rushing. The biggest problem stated simply is "what to do with the freshmen." The freshmen this past semester had, as a group, two self-generated social functions: the set of dance week-end parties and the house warming for Norton Hall. Earlier in the year a group of girls were brought down from Denison and, despite the success of the venture the wisdom, of a repeat in the future is to be doubted, and indeed, no further move has ever been mentioned by the Dean.

The administration has indicated it does not want to run a college on the Hill and a prep school at Harcourt. It has said this in reaction to incidents which have happened in the Lewis-Norton area. These incidents were and will be inevitable unless the present procedure is changed. They are a result of the lack of a normal social outlet for the freshmen. Yet, what has the administration done? In attempts to create social outlets which would help prevent such unfortunate incidents, the freshman social committee got bogged down in red tape. Instead of finding the active encouragement which, of right, they expected from the administration, they were frustrated at every turn.

A freshman coming to college looks forward to college social life. If he finds it withheld, there will be trouble, insensible drinking, unconscious destruction, and a general disturbance of the peace. The administration obviously does not want trouble, yet, it has taken no steps to obviate conditions which cause trouble. We do not pretend to know what steps should be taken. We do, however, recognize that these steps cannot be arrived at solely by the administration. Neither can they be arrived at by a salutary neglect in the hope that the situation will work itself out.

We need action, prompt and vigorous action. As the first step we suggest the creation of a committee of freshmen, upperclassmen, and administration representatives to study the matter and report their findings to the Pan-Hellenic council and to the administration. We feel that such a report could be the basis of a new policy which must be worked out if second semester rushing is to continue.

Unless this problem can be overcome, we say **ABOLISH** second semester rushing. At the moment its faults far exceed its benefits.

## CAGERS UPSET ASHLAND, GINGERICH SCORES 16

After spotting Ashland a 13 point lead in the early minutes of play, the Kenyon basketball team came from behind in the closing minutes to eke out a 64-63 victory Wednesday night. A clutch field goal by Dick Fleser and a free throw by Frank Gingerich gave the Lords their margin of victory in the last minute of play. With no time remaining on the scoreboard clock, McVicker missed a free throw that would have sent the game into overtime.

The Lords failed to gain any ground in the first half and faced a 41-26 deficit at intermission. In the second half, however, they found the key and scored 38 points to the losers' 22. The lead changed hands six times in the last six minutes.

Gingerich was high man for Kenyon with 16 markers. Bumstead and Lowry followed with 15 and 12. Conley led both teams with 26 points.

With five minutes gone in the first quarter, Ashland held a 14-1 lead. Throughout the first half they played a wide-open passing and driving game that the Lords found hard to stop. In the second half Kenyon forced their opponents to play their own slow type of ball game.

## Mermen Swamp W'berg 62-21

Winning their seventh straight meet of the season, the Kenyon Lords drowned Wittenberg last Saturday, 62-21. The Lords, using many of their second line swimmers, took all but two events. Hilty and R. Emory of Wittenberg captured the visitors' only victories in the fancy diving and 100 yd. free style respectively.

Three pool and varsity records were set by the Kenyon mermen, two of which were swum in exhibition. Stan Krok turned in a record 2:23.3 for the 200 yd. backstroke. Phil Payton finished second and also broke the old record. Ted FitzSimons, swimming exhibition, broke the 100 yd. free style record with a time of :53.0. Also swimming exhibition, Captain Al Eastman lowered the 440 free style record to 5:05.

Leading all the way, the Kenyon mermen racked up their eighth consecutive victory of the season Wednesday afternoon as they splashed their way to a 57-27 win over Kent State. The visiting Flashes took only two events, although they did make two others very close. Honors for the day went to Skip Kurrus, who took two events, and to Al Eastman, who set a new 440 yd. free style record in his farewell bid to Shaffer Pool.

## KENYON WINS 2 EASY MEETS

Akron University and Ohio Wesleyan joined the ranks of teams beaten by Coach Bob Bartels' swimmers as both succumbed to the powerful Lords by scores of 62-21 and 52-32. Neither team presented the Kenyon mermen with a serious threat, and Coach Bartels was allowed to experiment freely.

The Lords won all but one of the events in the Akron meet. Kenyon did not officially enter a team in the 440 free style relay. Stan Krok set a new pool and varsity record for the 200 yd. backstroke with a time of 2:24.7. Skip Kurrus was the meet's only double winner as he coped both the 50 and 100 yd. free style events.

Ohio Wesleyan did not live up to their advance notices as they also proved easy prey for the Lords. Ted FitzSimons had quite a day for himself as he won both the 100 and 220 yd. free style races. His time of 2:15.1 in the 220 yd. free style set a new pool and varsity record. Stan Krok tied his own record for the 200 yd. backstroke.

Both meets were held before a packed gallery at Shaffer Pool.

## Matmen Tie Oberlin 15-15
