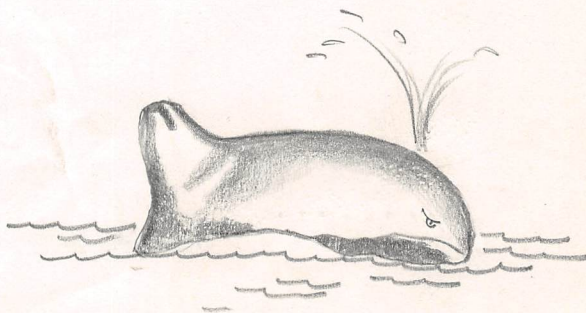
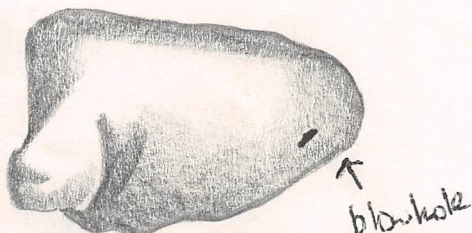

Figurine Fragment - broken - originally part of dolphins so wonderfully illustrated in the report drawing. It is thought that the La Sierrans were wary of water mammals - so that reason we have many of these fragments. We have taken the liberty of what the original would have looked like. A generally friendly and unassuming creature, the dolphin proved to be a perfect representation of the Non-Maya residing at La Sierra. As a land mammal would be, the dolphin symbolizes the hopes & aspirations of the site Classic La Sierrans contacted concerning the more complex society of their neighbors to the north.
